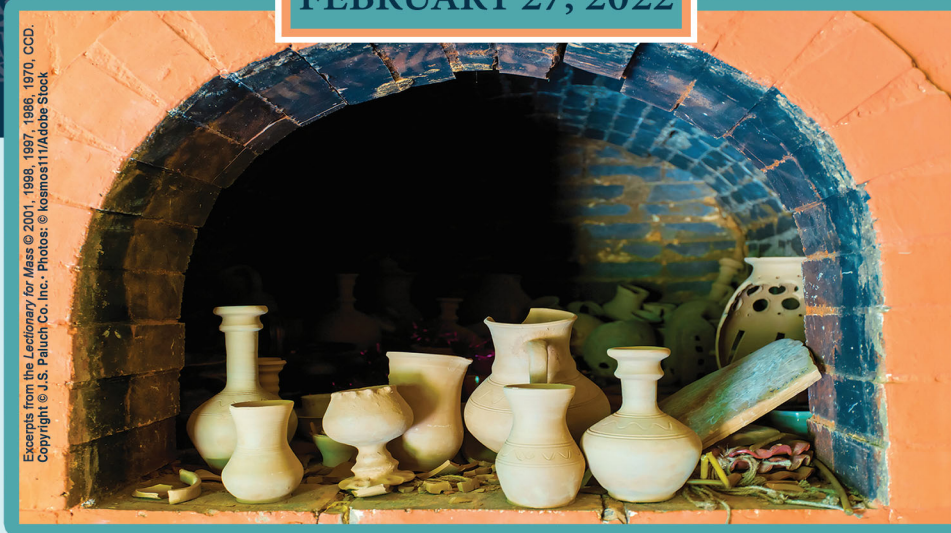

Eighth Sunday of Ordinary Time (C)
February 27th, 2022
Sir 27: 4-7 / Ps 92: 23, 13-16 / 1 Cor 15: 54-58 / Lk 6: 39-45

God is our model of perfection. We may pass the judgement of men and even pass ourselves an assessment that we are better than others. But if we make an earnest examination of how we are able to meet the standards of goodness of God, we can only humbly admit that we have fallen short of the perfection that we pride ourselves in.

This is why Christ in our Gospel tells us to remove the plank in our eyes; to take away, as it were, our attitude of smugness, our holier-than-thou disposition, superiority complex and our being judgmental of others. We have no right to criticize others if we ourselves are full of mistakes.

The Greek word for pride literally means “showing one’s self above.” A proud person is his own adviser and looks down on others with contempt. He fails to see his own sins and shortcomings. What he sees are the faults of others. For this reason, he is like a blind man who is acting like a fool. Christ would call this kind of person a hypocrite.

Let us bear in mind that if there was anything that Christ was intolerant about it was hypocrisy. He forgave the woman taken in adultery; he accepted the repentance of Mary Magdalene; he praised Zacchaeus who promised to undo the injustice he had done; he made Matthew, the tax collector a disciple; he even forgave the repentant thief in his dying hour on the cross.

But when it came to hypocrisy, he was outspoken and severe. He described the Pharisees and scribes as people who cleaned the outside of the cup and leave the inside full of intemperance. He told them that were like “whitewashed tombs beautiful in appearance, but inside there are only dead bones and uncleanness.” In the same way they “appear as religious men before people, but... full of hypocrisy and wickedness within” (Mt. 23:27-28).

It is noteworthy that the more people become closer to God, the more humble they become. St. Paul could speak of sinners “of whom I am the first” (1 Tim. 1:15). St. Francis of Assisi could say, “There is nowhere a more wretched and miserable sinner than I.”

The Gospel this Sunday concludes that “each man speaks from his heart’s abundance.” For Jesus, the heart is the center of the whole person. Only in the purity of heart can we recognize that we are in a constant need of conversion. It is by God’s grace that we can keep our hearts truly clean, truly fruitful and loving. Indeed, “Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God” (Mt. 5:8).

Lent

The season of Lent starts on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Thursday before the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper. From then on until Easter Sunday the Church celebrates the Easter Triduum of Christ's passion and death and burial, and resurrection.

Lent is characterized by penance for our past sins, works of mercy especially towards the poor, and personal preparation for the renewal of our baptismal promises on Easter Vigil. Our tears of penance renew in our hearts and souls in the water of baptism.

The ashes imposed on us on Ash Wednesday remind us that we are dust and to dust we shall return and that therefore the entire life of a Christian should be marked by the works of self-denial and generosity. The traditional discipline of Lent consists of constant prayer and reading of God's word, fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, abstinence from meat on Fridays, and works of mercy especially to those who have less in life. What is important is that through prayer and good works we allow God's grace to bring about our interior conversions. The sacrament of penance should accompany our Lenten observance.

Holy Week is the high point of the Lenten season. It opens with the procession with blessed palms and the gospel reading of the passion and death of Our Savior. The triumphal entry into Jerusalem ended on Calvary, but we know that Good Friday led to Easter Sunday.

The Biblical readings and prefaces extol the virtue of conversion of life, the need to fulfill our baptismal promises, joyful acceptance of daily trials for the love of God, and unselfish service to all who need our assistance.

Saints Katherine Drexel's Story

If your father is an international banker and you ride in a private railroad car, you are not likely to be drawn into a life of voluntary poverty. But if your mother opens your home to the poor three days each week and your father spends half an hour each evening in prayer, it is not impossible that you will devote your life to the poor and give away millions of dollars. Katharine Drexel did that.

Born in Philadelphia in 1858, she had an excellent education and traveled widely. As a rich girl, Katharine also had a grand debut into society. But when she nursed her stepmother through a three-year terminal illness, she saw that all the Drexel money could not buy safety from pain or death, and her life took a profound turn.

Katharine had always been interested in the plight of the Indians, having been appalled by what she read in Helen Hunt Jackson's *A Century of Dishonor*. While on a European tour, she met Pope Leo XIII and asked him to send more missionaries to Wyoming for her friend Bishop James O'Connor. The pope replied, "Why don't you become a missionary?" His answer shocked her into considering new possibilities.

Back home, Katharine visited the Dakotas, met the Sioux leader Red Cloud and began her systematic aid to Indian missions.

Katharine Drexel could easily have married. But after much discussion with Bishop O'Connor, she wrote in 1889, "The feast of Saint Joseph brought me the grace to give the remainder of my life to the Indians and the Colored." Newspaper headlines screamed "Gives Up Seven Million!"

After three and a half years of training, Mother Drexel and her first band of nuns—Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and Colored—opened a boarding school in Santa Fe. A string of foundations followed. By 1942, she had a system of black Catholic schools in 13 states, plus 40 mission centers and 23 rural schools. Segregationists harassed her work, even burning a school in Pennsylvania. In all, she established 50 missions for Indians in 16 states.

Two saints met when Mother Drexel was advised by Mother Cabrini about the "politics" of getting her order's Rule approved in Rome. Her crowning achievement was the founding of Xavier University in New Orleans, the first Catholic university in the United States for African Americans.

At 77, Mother Drexel suffered a heart attack and was forced to retire. Apparently her life was over. But now came almost 20 years of quiet, intense prayer from a small room overlooking the sanctuary. Small notebooks and slips of paper record her various prayers, ceaseless aspirations, and meditations. She died at 96 and was canonized in 2000.

Reflection

Saints have always said the same thing: Pray, be humble, accept the cross, love and forgive. But it is good to hear these things in the American idiom from one who, for instance, had her ears pierced as a teenager, who resolved to have "no cake, no preserves," who wore a watch, was interviewed by the press, traveled by train, and could concern herself with the proper size of pipe for a new mission. These are obvious reminders that holiness can be lived in today's culture as well as in that of Jerusalem or Rome.
