Seventh Sunday of Ordinary Time (C) February 20th, 2022 1 Sm 26:2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-23 / Ps 103:1-4, 8, 10, 12-13 / 1 Cor 15:45-49 / Lk 6:27-38

There's a principle that you have to fight fire with fire. It means we cannot let people take advantage of us. If people insult you, don't hesitate to insult them too.

The approach of Jesus is different. We have to conquer fire with water. Did you ever hear of the saying, "Grievous words stir up anger, but soft words turneth away wrath"? The fire of hatred should be dealt with the quenching water of love. Instead of becoming evil because the other person is evil, let the other person discover his goodness by being influenced by your steadfast kindness.

This is of course, easier said than done. For the most of us, love means love of one's family, relatives, and friends. There's nothing wrong with loving the people nearest and dearest to us. We cannot simply help loving them.

But Christ our Lord tells us, "If you love those who love you, what is special about that? Do not even tax collectors do as much? And if you are friendly only to your friends, what is so exceptional about that? Do not even the pagans do as much?" (Mt. 5: 46-47).

St. Paul in our second reading underlined that "the spiritual was not first; first came the natural and after that the spiritual" (1 Cor. 15:46). In our natural life, we are one with Adam, sharing his sin, his rebellious nature and weakness. But in the spiritual life, we are one with Christ, sharing his holiness, obedience, and perfection.

We cannot hope to triumph over our natural tendency to anger and to bitterness without Christ. It is only when Christ's grace live in our hearts that we can open up to the possibility of loving our enemies, doing good to those who hate us, blessing those who curse us, and praying for those who maltreat us.

Our world today is characterized by the vicious cycle of violence, revenge and hatred. "An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth," can only put in motion a never-ending pattern of retaliation and resentment. Christ came to break this Lex Taliones policy, this law is tit for tat. He declared: "For your part you shall be righteous and perfect in the way your heavenly father is righteous and perfect" (Mt. 5:48).

True perfections consists in imitating the Father. God's love is universal. He sends his rain on both the just and the unjust. His compassion embraces saints and sinners alike. It is that love that we must imitate.

"There are many kinds of alms," According to St. Augustine, "the giving of which helps us to obtain pardon for our sins." "But no one," he adds, "is greater than that by which we forgive from our hearts a sin that someone has committed against us."

In the Lord's Prayer, we pray that God may forgive our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. Then just before receiving holy communion we say, "Lord, I am not worthy to receive you but only say the word and I shall be healed."

Let us pray for that healing. Let us pray for Christ's grace to love even our enemies, to forgive and pray for them. Hopefully, we can truly become the children of God.

Noted surgeon, professor and highly credentialed Dr. Joseph Ricotta will lecture on vascular health issues and state of the state-of the art-surgical procedures:

Joseph Ricotta, MD, MS, DFSVS, FACS is a nationally and internationally renowned expert and innovator in the field of Vascular and Endovascular Surgery. He was the first in the U.S. to perform Endovascular Robotic Surgery, the first in Florida to perform the TCAR (transcarotid artery revascularization) procedure and has performed over 200 procedures since, making Delray Medical Center a national TCAR Center of Excellence. He was also the first in Southeast U.S. to perform VenasealTM procedure for treatment of venous insufficiency In addition, he pioneered renowned limb-preservation and pulmonary embolism treatment programs in Palm Beach County and founded the Florida Atlantic University (FAU) Vascular Surgery Fellowship and is a professor of surgery at FAU School of Medicine where he is training future vascular surgeons. Dr. Ricotta has also authored more than 200 publications and delivered more than 350 lectures.

Saint of the Week

Saints Polycarp's Story

Polycarp, bishop of Smyrna, disciple of Saint John the Apostle and friend of Saint Ignatius of Antioch, was a revered Christian leader during the first half of the second century.

Saint Ignatius, on his way to Rome to be martyred, visited Polycarp at Smyrna, and later at Troas wrote him a personal letter. The Asia Minor Churches recognized Polycarp's leadership by choosing him as a representative to discuss with Pope Anicetus the date of the Easter celebration in Rome—a major controversy in the early Church.

Only one of the many letters written by Polycarp has been preserved, the one he wrote to the Church of Philippi in Macedonia.

At 86, Polycarp was led into the crowded Smyrna stadium to be burned alive. The flames did not harm him and he was finally killed by a dagger. The centurion ordered the saint's body burned. The "Acts" of Polycarp's martyrdom are the earliest preserved, fully reliable account of a Christian martyr's death. He died in 155.

Reflection

Polycarp was recognized as a Christian leader by all Asia Minor Christians—a strong fortress of faith and loyalty to Jesus Christ. His own strength emerged from his trust in God, even when events contradicted this trust. Living among pagans and under a government opposed to the new religion, he led and fed his flock. Like the Good Shepherd, he laid down his life for his sheep and kept them from more persecution in Smyrna. He summarized his trust in God just before he died: "Father... I bless Thee, for having made me worthy of the day and the hour..." (Acts of Martyrdom, Chapter 14).
