Louis Evely in the "Gospels without Myth: said that "God is not an idea, or a definition that we have committed to memory; he is a presence which we experience in our hearts." When we say we have faith, it means we completely trust God, not so much on the weight of evidence that favors it, not on the intellectual formula that supports it, not on our human verification of actually having seen him ourselves, but on the certainty of someone who can never fail us. Real faith is total adherence and trust on God's word and his promises because God, who can never deceive nor be deceived, said so.

We are presently living in an age of technology and computers. The advancement of knowledge and skills has somehow left us in a vague feeling that the modern-day man is sufficient and omnipotent. Many things which we considered before as muster that only God can explain, he can now unravel himself. He has made tremendous discoveries in the sciences and technology, marvels and phenomena which he thought were exclusively God's.

This new- found confidence of man in his own powers makes it difficult to have real faith in God. This is especially true when there is no logical proof and rational confirmation, we liken faith in God to a money-back guarantee scheme. Often, we seem to be saying to God: 'Show me first and I will believe later.' We bargain with God, or we give way to nonchalance. We make God irrelevant in our life.

This was the kind of reaction that Thomas expressed when the disciples told him that they had seen the Lord. He wanted to see for himself Christ's nail-prints, nail-marks and the wound on his side. A man who has this 'seeing-is-believing' attitude is called a doubting Thomas.

A week later, the Lord appeared to them again and this time, Thomas was there. Jesus said to Thomas: "Do not persist in your unbelief, but believe!" He said in response. "My Lord and my God."

Thomas never lacked courage In fact, when Jesus had suggested that they go to Bethany upon learning of the death of Lazarus, Thomas said to his fellow disciples: "Let us also go that we may die with him" (Jn. 11:16). And yet, he was the man overwhelmed with discouragement when Jesus died. He carried his own sorrow by himself. He left the fellowship of the community. He had failed to consider the importance of being in the community in times of fear, doubt and pain. We break bread at Mass and this teaches us to share among ourselves the joys as well as the trails of our journey of faith.

We, too, are afraid at times. We cannot sometimes see the presence of the risen Christ during our dark moments. We need the support of others when we are overwhelmed with our grief and suffering. People can inspire us to take courage by believing first in spite of everything that we may see the power of God. Yes, trust first in Jesus and we can certainly see his love.

Jesus encourages us: "Don't be afraid, only believe" (Mk 5:36). Let us pray for more faith in this Mass. Let us appreciate the presence of our Christian community. Indeed, "Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe" (Jn 20:29). In the depths of our heart, let us silently pray: "Lord, I do believe. Help me believe more" (Mk 9:24)



Mother's Day

On Sunday May 9th, we will be celebrating Mother's day. We recall one of the people who gave us life. I hope you will get a visit from your children or at least a phone call or text message.

Cardinal Sin loves to recall the story of Giuseppe Sarto who become a Pope and saint. He is known as Pius X. When he was consecrated Bishop of Mantua, he want to see his mother and showed her his precious episcopal ring, saying proudly: "Mother, look at the beautiful ring I received." She smiled and showed him her wedding ring and said: "My son, without this ring you wouldn't have received yours."

What is a mother? The late Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty described her as "the most important person on earth. She cannot claim the honor of having built Notre Dame Cathedral. She need not. She has built something more magnificent than any cathedral a dwelling for an immortal soul, the tiny perfection of her baby's body."

St. Paul tells us in his letter to the Galatians: "When the fullness of time came, God sent his Son. He came born of a woman...in order to redeem... make us adopted sons and daughters of God. And because you are sons, God has sent into your hearts the spirit of his son which cries out: Abba! That is: Father!" (Gal. 4: 4-6).

This is the reason why mothers have a very glorious dignity because Jesus, the Redeemer had deemed it worthy to be born, formed and loved by a mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary. All mothers are special before God.

We encourage you to participate in our Novena of Masses for our mothers. They need our prayers. Mother's Day novena envelopes are located next to the doors in the church and please return them before or on Mother's Day. We start the novena of masses that day at 9am. A special blessing and roses will be distributed for our mothers after all the masses.



Saint Catherine of Siena's Story

The value Catherine makes central in her short life and which sounds clearly and consistently through her experience is complete surrender to Christ. What is most impressive about her is that she learns to view her surrender to her Lord as a goal to be reached through time.

She was the 23rd child of Jacopo and Lapa Benincasa and grew up as an intelligent, cheerful, and intensely religious person. Catherine disappointed her mother by cutting off her hair as a protest against being overly encouraged to improve her appearance in order to attract a husband. Her father ordered her to be left in peace, and she was given a room of her own for prayer and meditation.

She entered the Dominican Third Order at 18 and spent the next three years in seclusion, prayer, and austerity. Gradually, a group of followers gathered around her—men and women, priests and religious. An active public apostolate grew out of her contemplative life. Her letters, mostly for spiritual instruction and encouragement of her followers, began to take more and more note of public affairs. Opposition and slander resulted from her mixing fearlessly with the world and speaking with the candor and authority of one completely committed to Christ. She was cleared of all charges at the Dominican General Chapter of 1374.

Her public influence reached great heights because of her evident holiness, her membership in the Dominican Third Order, and the deep impression she made on the pope. She worked tirelessly for the crusade against the Turks and for peace between Florence and the pope.

In 1378, the Great Schism began, splitting the allegiance of Christendom between two, then three, popes and putting even saints on opposing sides. Catherine spent the last two years of her life in Rome, in prayer and pleading on behalf of the cause of Pope Urban VI and the unity of the Church. She offered herself as a victim for the Church in its agony. She died surrounded by her "children" and was canonized in 1461.

Catherine ranks high among the mystics and spiritual writers of the Church. In 1939, she and Francis of Assisi were declared co-patrons of Italy. Pope Paul VI named her and Teresa of Avila doctors of the Church in 1970. Her spiritual testament is found in *The Dialogue*.

Reflection

Though she lived her life in a faith experience and spirituality far different from that of our own time, Catherine of Siena stands as a companion with us on the Christian journey in her undivided effort to invite the Lord to

take flesh in her own life. Events which might make us wince or chuckle or even yawn fill her biographies: a mystical experience at six, childhood betrothal to Christ, stories of harsh asceticism, her frequent ecstatic visions. Still, Catherine lived in an age which did not know the rapid change of 21st-century mobile America. The value of her life for us to-day lies in her recognition of holiness as a goal to be sought over the course of a lifetime.
