



#### The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) June 19th, 2022 Gn 14: 18-20 / Ps 110: 1-4 / 1 Cor 11: 23-26 / Lk 9:11b-17

We wonder how many people have ever seen the Vitamin A in a carrot, the Vitamin C in an orange or the potassium in a banana. We've seen lots of vitamin pills, but we wouldn't know what an actual vitamin molecule looked like even if it came up and bit us. Yet the experts tell us they are in certain foods whether we can see them or not. With this thought in mind we could make a simple comparison with the Eucharist, in so far as we cannot see Christ present in the Eucharist; but it doesn't matter that we can't see him, he is still there. Health experts tell us that without the sufficient amounts of vitamins, minerals, carbohydrates, proteins and fats in our diet we will not be healthy and we may even die. We are told to eat a variety of foods so that we get all the nutrients we need. We tend not to question the health experts that tell us all of this. We trust they know what they are talking about. Even though there is probably no one here who follows their recommendations perfectly, I think many of us are beginning to pay attention to following a good diet, especially as some of us get older.

Today's feast puts us in touch with another expert, Jesus. He tells us what we need to do to be healthy spiritually. How do we know he is an expert we should listen to. Well, he told us he knows what is he talking about, but he also knows many will not believe him just because he said so. So, he told us if we are not sure we want to believe him, to look at his works. "If I do not perform my Father's works, do not believe me; but if I perform them, even if you do not believe me, believe the works, so that you may realize that the Father is in me and I am in the Father." Of course we were not there personally to see the miracles of Jesus worked, but there were many who did witness his works and there were those who gave their lives as a testimony that what they preached about Jesus was true. So if we decide to believe the words of those who saw him and knew him and who died for him, then we can only conclude that when he speaks to us about things that are beyond us we ought to listen to what he has to say. And if we listen to what he had to say, we will discover that he has a few things to say about nutrition too. He doesn't tell us about the vitamins and minerals we need to keep our physical lives healthy though. He has a much greater purpose in mind. He tells us, "I came that they may have life and may have it to the full." (Jn 10:10) And the food that will nourish that life is himself. For he tells us "I am the bread of life." (Jn 6:35) "Whoever eats this bread will live forever." (Jn 6:58) Now that's ultimate healthy diet. Today's gospel tells us how he becomes our food.

It has always been a help to me to see in the host and chalice a divine energy - the same energy that flows through a vine and its branches which Jesus tells us about in John chapter 15. Or it's the same divine energy that flows through our body, like the body that Paul talks about in I Cor 12: 27 when he tells us: "you are Christ's body and individually parts of it." Today we celebrate the feast of the body and Blood of Christ. It is a feast to strengthen our faith in Jesus' true presence in the Eucharist, a presence which feeds and nourishes us and a presence that reminds us that he is with us and loves us. People who don't like to go to Church may say, of course he is always with us. That's true (it's true even when we're not with him) but he is especially with us in the sacrament of the Eucharist. Those who miss the Eucharist are missing the most profound experience of union with God that is offered to us in this world. Amen.

# **Knights of Columbus**





He grew up in Brooklyn NY with his twin sister, Elain and Brother Dan, His parents, Madeline and Leonad and he had been a Yankee fan for many years.



# Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood if Christ Corpus Christi June 19, 2022


During the Final Blessing, the celebrant will bless the people with the Blessed Sacrament in all the masses on this solemnity.

# Saint Aloysius Gonzaga's Story

The Lord can make saints anywhere, even amid the brutality and license of Renaissance life. Florence was the "mother of piety" for Aloysius Gonzaga despite his exposure to a "society of fraud, dagger, poison, and lust." As a son of a princely family, he grew up in royal courts and army camps. His father wanted Aloysius to be a military hero.

At age 7 Aloysius experienced a profound spiritual quickening. His prayers included the Office of Mary, the psalms, and other devotions. At age 9 he came from his hometown of Castiglione to Florence to be educated; by age 11 he was teaching catechism to poor children, fasting three days a week, and practicing great austerities. When he was 13 years old, he traveled with his parents and the Empress of Austria to Spain, and acted as a page in the court of Philip II. The more Aloysius saw of court life, the more disillusioned he became, seeking relief in learning about the lives of saints.

A book about the experience of Jesuit missionaries in India suggested to him the idea of entering the Society of Jesus, and in Spain his decision became final. Now began a four-year contest with his father. Eminent churchmen and laypeople were pressed into service to persuade Aloysius to remain in his "normal" vocation. Finally he prevailed, was allowed to renounce his right to succession, and was received into the Jesuit novitiate.


Like other seminarians, Aloysius was faced with a new kind of penance—that of accepting different ideas about the exact nature of penance. He was obliged to eat more, and to take recreation with the other students. He was forbidden to pray except at stated times. He spent four years in the study of philosophy and had Saint Robert Bellarmine as his spiritual adviser.


In 1591, a plague struck Rome. The Jesuits opened a hospital of their own. The superior general himself and many other Jesuits rendered personal service. Because he nursed patients, washing them and making their beds, Aloysius caught the disease. A fever persisted after his recovery and he was so weak

he could scarcely rise from bed. Yet he maintained his great discipline of prayer, knowing that he would die three months later within the octave of Corpus Christi, at the age of 23.

### Reflection

As a saint who fasted, scourged himself, sought solitude and prayer, and did not look on the faces of women, Aloysius seems an unlikely patron of youth in a society where asceticism is confined to training camps of football teams and boxers, and sexual permissiveness has little left to permit. Can an overweight and airconditioned society deprive itself of anything? It will when it discovers a reason, as Aloysius did. The motivation for letting God purify us is the experience of God loving us in prayer.





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
