MAL 3:19-20A | PS 98:5-6, 7-8, 9 | 2 THES 3:7-12 | LK 21:5-19

In our Gospel reading, some people were beholding the magnificent Temple of Jerusalem with gilded pinnacles and ornamented with gold plating. It took almost fifty years to rebuild this impressive structure. But Christ predicted its complete destruction "when not one stone will be left on another, but it will all be torn down." The Temple was associated with God's presence and thus, if it was destroyed, the disciples thought this would mean the end of the world. They asked him, "When will this occur, Teacher?" This might as well be our question too: "When will this happen?" We want to know when so that we will be prepared. One of the greatest fears that disturbs us is the fear of uncertainty over the future. Nevertheless, common sense dictates us that to reduce the margin of unpredictability, we make plans and provisions for the future over certain goals that we want to achieve. Peter Drucker, a management expert, said: "The purpose of planning is not to show the future, but rather to uncover the things we must do today in order to have a future."

A student, for instance, has to study his lesson to make certain that he can pass his course; lovers have to undergo a tedious process to brace themselves for marriage; a pregnant woman has to gird herself for birth; a businessman has to make a feasibility study before undertaking an enterprise.


What about us Christians? This may sound morbid, but we have to prepare for our death. Death, as we know, is not the end of life; it is only a prelude to the promise of eternity. Death gives us this awareness of our life's limitation. We can realize that there are higher things we cannot postpone, and

a higher destiny worth living and longing for. We will have a future after death if we try to carry out what Christ, our Lord, wants us to do in this life. Only then can we consider death as a beginning of our destiny to everlasting life.

Christ did not give the specific time nor day of the end of the world. What he provided was the signs preceding the Parousia, the last days. Our role is not to speculate when, but to be prepared always for any eventuality. "So stay awake," Christ said, "because you do not know when the master of the house is coming, evening, mid-night, cockcrow, dawn; if he comes unexpectedly, he must not find you asleep" (Mk. 13:35-37).

Tomorrow bespeaks postponement. Good intentions must be translated to concrete actions. In the matter of salvation and the life of the Spirit, it consists of the urgencies of the present. Christ emphasized that urgency when he said: "See that you are dressed for action and have your lamps lit. Be like men waiting for their master to return ... Happy those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes" (Lk. 12: 35-37).

Let us always remember that "yesterday is but a dream and tomorrow is only a vision, but today well-lived makes every tomorrow a vision of hope! Look well, therefore, to this day" ("Salutation of the Dawn"). Indeed, "the time is at hand" and yes, the time is now.





OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE




Sunday November 20th is the 34th or Last Sunday of Ordinary Time and the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.

Think of this: Moses worked 40 years to establish Judaism. For 45 years Buddha taught the way of enlightenment. For 23 years Muhammad preached his doctrine to his followers. The carpenter on the cross, with the sign above his head, Jesus Christ, king of the Jews, from the backwater, a religiously insignificant area of Galilee, worked for only three years to preach the kingdom of God. And after two thousand years about two billion people, including ourselves, call him our king! That in itself is a miracle. That shows tremendous foolishness or tremendous faith. We have chosen to follow a king who does not parade around in worldly glory or demonstrate worldly power. We follow a king who we believe to be "the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation." Our king was willing to come down to our level, to know first hand what suffering, rejection, misunderstanding, humiliation was like, and he proclaimed he has the power to transport us to a better life, a kingdom of peace and love and joy, if we want to follow him there. Other than royal robes and golden crowns, the other thing we automatically associate with kings is that they order people around.

They have the authority to make rules. Jesus told us what he wants. He wants us to enjoy eternal life and everlasting happiness with him in the kingdom of God. And the rules he gave us exist only to help us get there. And this is where it is a little harder for all of us to follow him as king. It's easy to admire him as a great and loving person. It stretches our faith a little more to admit he is God's Son and "the image of the invisible God" in the most literal sense of the words. But it really proves whether we see him as our king, if we are willing to recognize he has the authority to tell us how to live. When we admit that he has the authority to us that we should pray, that we must keep the commandments, that we are to forgive others, to share our resources with those less fortunate, to live chaste lives, to believe in and nourish ourselves with his unique presence in the Eucharist, then, in the most concrete way, we acknowledge him as our king.

Christ did not take up a cross just for the fun of it.

He suffered to save us. But he can only save us if we do not forget that he is always our king, not just in an abstract way but in our concrete, everyday lives.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

SAINT AGNES OF ASSISI'S STORY

FEAST DAY: NOVEMBER 19


Born Caterina Offreducia, Agnes was the younger sister of Saint Clare, and her first follower. When Caterina left home two weeks after Clare's departure, their family attempted to bring her back by force. They tried to drag her out of the monastery, but her body suddenly became so heavy that several knights could not budge it. Her uncle Monaldo tried to strike her but was temporarily paralyzed. The knights then left Caterina and Clare in peace. Saint Francis himself gave Clare's sister the name Agnes, because she was gentle like a young lamb.

Agnes matched her sister in devotion to prayer and in willingness to endure the strict penances that characterized the Poor Ladies' lives at San Damiano. In 1221, a group of Benedictine nuns in Monticelli near Florence asked to become Poor Ladies. Saint Clare sent Agnes to become abbess of that monastery. Agnes soon wrote a rather sad letter about how much she missed Clare and the other nuns at San Damiano. After establishing other monasteries of Poor Ladies in northern Italy, Agnes was recalled to San Damiano in 1253, as Clare lay dying.

Three months later Agnes followed Clare in death, and was canonized in 1753.

Reflection

God must love irony; the world is so full of it. In 1212, many in Assisi surely felt that Clare and Agnes were wasting their lives and were turning their backs on the world. In reality, their lives were tremendously life-giving, and the world has been enriched by the example of these poor contemplatives.
