

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

NOVEMBER 27, 2022

IS 2: 1-5 | PS 122: 1-9 | ROM 13: 11-14 | MT 24:37-44

As we are celebrating the first Sunday of Advent, our holy Mother Church is inviting us to make the right preparation for the coming Christmas for the right reason. This preparation primarily involves a spiritual renewal on our part, notwithstanding the material and festive trimmings that accompany it, so that we can spend a meaningful observance of the coming birthday of Christ. There is a danger that Christmas has become so commercialized that it loses altogether the true spirit and the real meaning of its salvific event. We are then enjoined to cleanse ourselves of our sinfulness, and to share the love that we received from the Father through his Son. Expect the birth of the Savior with a joyful heart for he comes to bring hope and redemption to mankind.

Many people are asking: "Why is it that I have a string of problems? (One is just over, and here, another one comes.)

I'd like to believe, that God, in his wisdom and goodness, provides us with constant trials, not only to make us better and stronger persons, but to make us uncomfortable with this life.

What do I mean? A person who is comfortable, who has no problems, is in a precarious situation to be dormant in his relationship with God. He might be so at home in this world that he forgets that there is another life, a fuller and perfect life awaiting him. Experience tells us

that if we are in a relaxing position like lying, we want to sleep; if we are in a comfortable bed, we can even fall asleep easily. Christ reminds us in the Gospel: "Be on guard lest your spirits become bloated with indulgence and drunkenness and worldly cares. The great day will suddenly close in on you like a trap."

Thus, God gives us his wake-up calls in forms of trials or even tragedies, to keep us up and, about and yes, awake. This is to make us aware of the foolishness of being secure in this passing world, but not making ourselves secure before him. Let us not, however, be discouraged. After all, Christmas means the Redeemer came that he may be our strength and our salvation. Advent is an ideal time to accept Jesus into our lives. Let it be that we can receive joyfully the eternal friendship and the gift of salvation which he has freely offered to us.

PRAYER FOR THE PAVILION PROJECT



THE ADVENT WREATH TRADITION & MEANING

For many Christians, Advent wreaths are a favorite way to celebrate the Advent season leading up to Christmas Day. Although Advent Wreaths are very popular, many are not aware of the rich meaning and symbolism embedded in this tradition

DARKNESS AND LIGHT

Advent candles readily demonstrate the strong contrast between darkness and light, which is an important biblical image. Jesus referred to himself as the "Light of the World" that dispels the darkness of sin: "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life" (John 8:12).

Human history spanned long ages shrouded in the darkness of sin before our prophesied Savior would finally make his appearance to free us from its dominion. As the Messiah's "Advent" (or "coming") draws nearer another candle is lit, with each candle dispelling the darkness a little more. Thus, the Advent wreath helps us to spiritually contemplate the great drama of salvation history that surrounds the birth of God Incarnate, who comes to redeem the human race and make all things new (Rev. 21:5). It also reminds us that, as Christians, we're meant to shine the light of Christ in this world. As Jesus tells us, You are the light of the world ... let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven. (Matthew 5:14-16)

SHAPE: The circular shape of the wreath, without beginning or end, symbolizes God's complete and unending love for us.

NUMBER: The Advent Wreath traditionally holds four candles which are lit, one at a time, on each of the four Sundays of the Advent season. Some Advent wreath traditions also include a fifth white "Christ" candle, symbolizing purity, that is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas day. In our parish we have the pregnant mother Mary carrying her child Jesus in her womb.

COLOR: Violet is a liturgical color that is used to signify a time of prayer, penance, and sacrifice and is used during Advent and Lent

THE FOUR WEEKS OF ADVENT

During the first two weeks of Advent we light the first two purple candles. The Third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday. On this day we celebrate that our waiting for the birth of Jesus on Christmas day is almost over. Rose is a liturgical color that is used to signify joy, so we light the single pink candle on the third Sunday of Advent.

Then on the fourth Sunday of Advent, the final purple candle is lit to mark the final week of prayer and penance as we wait expectantly for the soon-coming birth of the King of Kings.

SAINT FRANCIS XAVIER'S STORY

FEAST DAY: NOVEMBER 30

Jesus asked, "What profit would there be for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life?" (Matthew 16:26a). The words were repeated to a young teacher of philosophy who had a highly promising career in academics, with success and a life of prestige and honor before him.

Francis Xavier, 24 at the time, and living and teaching in Paris, did not heed these words at once. They came from a good friend, Ignatius of Loyola, whose tireless persuasion finally won the young man to Christ. Francis then made the spiritual exercises under the direction of Ignatius, and in 1534, joined his little community, the infant Society of Jesus. Together at Montmartre they vowed poverty, chastity, obedience, and apostolic service according to the directions of the pope. From Venice, where he was ordained a priest in 1537, Xavier went on to Lisbon and from there sailed to the East Indies, landing at Goa, on the west coast of India. For the next 10 years he labored to bring the faith to such widely scattered peoples as the Hindus, the Malayans, and the Japanese. He spent much of that time in India, and served as provincial of the newly established Jesuit province of India.

Wherever he went, Xavier lived with the poorest people, sharing their food and rough accommodations. He spent countless hours ministering to the sick and the poor, particularly to lepers. Very often he had no time to sleep or even to say his breviary but, as we know from his letters, he was filled always with joy.

Xavier went through the islands of Malaysia, then up to Japan. He learned enough Japanese to preach to simple folk, to instruct, and to baptize, and to establish missions for those who were to follow him. From Japan he had dreams of going to China, but this plan was never realized. Before reaching the mainland, he died. His remains are enshrined in the Church of Good Jesus in Goa. He and Saint Thérèse of Lisieux were declared co-patrons of the missions in 1925.

Reflection:

All of us are called to "go and preach to all nations—see Matthew 28:19. Our preaching is not necessarily on distant shores but to our families, our children, our husband or wife, our coworkers. And we are called to preach not with words, but by our everyday lives. Only by sacrifice, the giving up of all selfish gain, could Francis Xavier be free to bear the Good News to the world. Sacrifice is leaving yourself behind at times for a greater good, the good of prayer, the good of helping someone in need, the good of just listening to another. The greatest gift we have is our time. Francis Xavier gave his to others.









Congratulations and Welcome to Our New Brother Knights!
