

One of the aspects of who we are as humans is that we are storytellers. Whether they are stories which are historical or imagined we use stories to communicate ideas, values and realities. They make the world, which can often seem complex and overwhelming, more approachable and manageable. Stories help us make sense of the world, they put it into an understandable narrative. When it comes to our faith as Catholic Christians stories are also incredibly important. The bible is filled with different stories and when taken as a whole, is itself one long story: the story of salvation history. This story of salvation history tells us how God created us in love, how we sinned and rejected that love and how God continually called Israel (his chosen people) back to his love, ultimately reconciling all of humanity through the death and resurrection of Jesus on the cross. This is the story of faith that God has spoken through scripture and it is one which we have heard many times.

The stories of scripture are not stories about things that happened a long time ago though. They are realities which exist here and now in and through Jesus. For all of salvation history finds itself in the person of Jesus. Scripture is your story and my story because of Jesus. It is personal,

tangible, alive in us because Jesus is alive and breathing in us. No other story on the face of the earth can make that claim because no other story has God as its storyteller. This is a fundamental reality which we as Catholic Christians believe. As believers and followers of Jesus we are invited by him to experience the reality that all of scripture, which is the story of salvation history, is made present in Jesus who lives is alive in us. He is present to our whole person body, mind and soul; closer to us than we are to ourselves. During this Holy Week we are invited to experience the realities of scripture alive in us through Jesus. We are invited, through the eyes of faith, to walk, talk, see, taste, touch and smell the story of Jesus as our own. Jesus asks us to hear in the gospels from today what it was like to be welcomed into Jerusalem with celebration and only days later be mocked, scourged, condemned and die on a cross. Jesus asks us to journey with him this Holy Week, to be close to him in his suffering as he is close to us in ours. So let us enter into the story of our own lives which is the story of Jesus, the story of our salvation.

SAINT VINCENT FERRER'S STORY

FEAST DAY: APRIL5

The polarization in the Church today is a mild breeze compared with the tornado that ripped the Church apart during the lifetime of this saint. If any saint is a patron of reconciliation, Vincent Ferrer is. Despite parental opposition, he entered the Dominican Order in his native Spain at 19. After brilliant studies, he was ordained a priest by Cardinal Peter de Luna—who would figure tragically in his life.

Of a very ardent nature, Vincent practiced the austerities of his Order with great energy. He was chosen prior of the Dominican house in Valencia shortly after his ordination.

The Western schism divided Christianity first between two, then three, popes. Clement VII lived at Avignon in France, Urban VI in Rome. Vincent was convinced the election of Urban was invalid, though Catherine of Siena was just as devoted a supporter of the Roman pope. In the service of Cardinal de Luna, Vincent worked to persuade Spaniards to follow Clement. When Clement died, Cardinal de Luna was elected at Avignon and became Benedict XIII.

Vincent worked for him as apostolic penitentiary and Master of the Sacred Palace. But the new pope did not resign as all candidates in the conclave had sworn to do. He remained stubborn, despite being deserted by the French king and nearly all of the cardinals.

Vincent became disillusioned and very ill, but finally took up the work of simply "going through the world preaching Christ," though he felt that any renewal in the Church depended on healing the schism. An eloquent and fiery preacher, he spent the last 20 years of his life spreading the Good News in Spain, France, Switzerland, the Low Countries and Lombardy, stressing the need of repentance and the fear of coming judgment. He became known as the "Angel of the Judgment."

Vincent tried unsuccessfully, in 1408 and 1415, to persuade his former friend to resign. He finally concluded that Benedict was not the true pope. Though very ill, he mounted the pulpit before an assembly over which Benedict himself was presiding, and thundered his denunciation of the man who had ordained him a priest. Benedict fled for his life, abandoned by those who had formerly supported him. Strangely, Vincent had no part in the Council of Constance, which ended the schism.

Reflection

The split in the Church at the time of Vincent Ferrer should have been fatal—36 long years of having two "heads." We cannot imagine what condition the Church today would be in if, for that length of time, half the world had followed a succession of popes in Rome, and half an equally "official" number of popes in say, Rio de Janeiro. It is an ongoing miracle that the Church has not long since been shipwrecked on the rocks of pride and ignorance, greed and ambition. Contrary to Lowell's words, "Truth forever on the scaffold, wrong forever on the throne," we believe that "truth is mighty, and it shall prevail"—but it sometimes takes a long time.

THE SYMBOLS OF LENT/ HOLY WEEK AND THE MEANING

Violet/Purple color: This is a somber color for the Lenten season which signifies humility, willingness to repent, mourning for the sins and suffering with Jesus.

Stones: They remind us of Jesus' experience in the desert for forty days and being tempted by the devil. Jesus was tempted by the devil to change stones into bread but he did not heed to the devil. He remained steadfast and overcame the temptations. The stones symbolize austerity and rigor, desolation, misery and sadness.

Sackcloth: Sackcloth is a coarse, cloth in which the Jewish people made from goat's hair. Today it can be made from flax or hemp or other natural fibers to create a rough, woven fabric. The Hebrews wore sackcloth, together with wood ashes, as a sign of mourning or repentance or when praying for certain serious needs. Sackcloth can be worn under one's clothes as a scapular or vest and can be inexpensively but from burlap or rough cloth. Sackcloth traditionally figures in Lent as a symbol of repentance from sin. LORD, let me cloth myself in the sackcloth of repentance. My sins irritate my conscience as sackcloth irritates a body.


Wheat: At the Last Supper, Jesus instituted the Eucharist. The bread that became his Body was made from wheat. Jesus used wheat in a parable when He said, "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat, but if it dies it bears much fruit." Jesus used wheat in a parable to refer to himself and the death that he was about to undergo. The parable also can refer to us in that we have to die to ourselves so that we can be resurrected to new life in Jesus. Just as all the grains of wheat are crushed to make flour for one loaf, so all of us who follow Christ will, through our sufferings, be united in His Body the Church.

Thorns: It reminds us of physical suffering, loneliness and injustices in the world.

Cross: It symbolizes victory over death and salvation from sin.

"I am the vine, you are the branches.

CONFIRMATION

The Bishop's guidelines for Confirmation attire is "the Confirmation candidates should be appropriately dressed which expresses the dignity of the Sacrament." The following suggestions are given:

BOYS:

Jacket or suit is optional, white shirt and tie, suit pants/trousers, dress shoes. ABSOLUTELY NO JEANS of any kind, TENNIS /ATHLETIC SHOES OR FLIP FLOPS. GIRLS: Dress that is simple, modest, any color and dress shoes or sandals. (Backless and off the shoulder dresses are not appropriate for this Mass) and should be covered with a sweater or jacket.

GIRLS:

Girls receiving their First Holy Communion should wear an all white dress. It may be simple or ornate but should not have any colored ribbons or adornments.

A child may wear a white veil to accompany the dress. It can be topped with another hair accessory such as a small tiara. Alternately, a white headband, a white barrette, a white ribbon or a white floral crown are allowed. Girls may wear white hose, knee socks, stockings, and white dress shoes or sandals.

Please NO GLOVES, PURSES or other items that may distract the child during the mass. BOYS:

Boys receiving their First Holy Communion may wear a light or dark colored suit, sports coat or jacket. A lighter colored suit is more suitable for this occasion but a dark or navy will be fine. They may also wear a white suit but this is not mandatory. A white shirt with a collar with long or short sleeves. Light or dark dress pants, with a belt. Boys should wear a solid colored tie in white, or blue or a tie with a subtle pattern. Dress shoes with socks. NO SNEAKERS.
