#### **WASHED IN HIS BLOOD**

Recently I was praying with a passage of scripture from the passion narrative of St. Matthew. The passage was Matthew 27:15-26. This is the passage in which Jesus is sentenced to death before Pilate. In which Barabbas is chosen by the crowd over Jesus. The section of the passage which made me stop and notice it though were the lines where Pilate tells the crowd that his hands are free of the innocent blood of Jesus. The crowd responds with such anger by saying, "His blood be upon us and upon our children".

When I first read the passage I didn't know why I felt drawn to it. It is a rather unusual line to be drawn to given the anger and the rage of the crowd. In the tradition of the Church though, when you pray with scripture you are supposed to notice the places you feel drawn to, even if they are uncomfortable. This form of prayer is called Lectio Divina and has been practiced since the very earliest days of the Church. As Catholics we believe that the Word of God, Jesus, is present in the scripture. When we read the scriptures it is Jesus being made present to us. Our thoughts and feelings, memories and imaginations when brought before Jesus all come into contact with the person of Christ present in the scripture and he touches us.

It was this experience that happened to me when I read the line, "His blood be upon us and upon our children". At first I didn't understand what the Lord was saying and doing through this passage though. It was such an unusual passage to be drawn to. As I sat with my confusion and lack of understanding the tone of the passage began to change however. I began to imagine myself in the crowd hurling the words of anger and rage at Pilate. As I yelled the words began to change. I began to yell for the blood of Jesus upon me not out of anger but out of desire. I began to ask the Lord for his blood to flow over me, to cleanse me. I began to experience, through the anger of the crowd, a deeper movement of the heart.

A wise priest once told me that underlying deep anger is even deeper grief. That is what I began to experience as I prayed with the anger of the crowd. Any anger that I had ever had at God, any resentment began to unleash the pain and the grief of my heart. So rather than being in a bloodthirsty rage, I became filled with remorse and sorrow. I was pleading that the blood of the Son of God would heal the pain, the grief and the sin of my life and my heart.

It was in this place that the Lord met me. I began to know in a deeper way that the Lord desired to shed his blood over me. All I have to do is call out to him, to confess my sin and my need for him and he will wash me in his blood. His blood is upon me and it makes me clean, it makes me new and it makes me whole. May the blood of Jesus be upon all of us.

#### Love and Truth

I think even the most devout, the most pious Catholic reading this could summon to mind, if asked, one or even two examples of Catholic teaching for which they have desperately looked for a loophole.

Don't worry, I won't make you share with the group. But bring it to your mind now: the doctrine you once resented, or perhaps still do. The commandment you don't fully understand, the one you bristle against. The rule you find the hardest to follow. The belief you hate explaining to your friends.

If it disappeared from scripture or dropped out of the catechism, would your life really be easier? Would you be happier?

I am thinking of mine. For a long time, I searched high and low for a way around this particular teaching. I read books and Scripture and tradition, I prayed and reflected and tried to argue with myself. For a time, I gave up complying with it entirely. I threw it to the wind, with a shoulder shrug and a self-satisfied assurance to myself that God, being a loving father, does not want his child to be unhappy.

But reader: I was miserable. I was so, so miserable, and I stayed that way until I finally accepted that God is, indeed, a loving father, and desires nothing less than the unhappiness of his children. And so, to ward it off, he has given us the truth, and asked us to share it amongst ourselves like a cherished heirloom, a priceless inheritance

To share truth, you must show love. To show love, you must share truth. One demands the other. Because this is what Christ does for us, and this is the mission of the Church in this world.

Loosening and binding. Bearing witness. Giving testimony. Speaking truth, and in speaking truth, showing love.

Protect us from all fear and anxiety of storms and give us an ardent trust and hope in Your love and mercy. You alone have the power to command the sea, the wind and the rain.






Early in the fourth century, Saint Helena, mother of the Roman Emperor Constantine, went to Jerusalem in search of the holy places of Christ's life. She razed the second-century Temple of Aphrodite, which tradition held was built over the Savior's tomb, and her son built the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher on that spot. During the excavation, workers found three crosses. Legend has it that the one on which Jesus died was identified when its touch healed a dying woman.

The cross immediately became an object of veneration. At a Good Friday celebration in Jerusalem toward the end of the fourth century, according to an eyewitness, the wood was taken out of its silver container and placed on a table together with the inscription Pilate ordered placed above Jesus' head: Then "all the people pass through one by one; all of them bow down, touching the cross and the inscription, first with their foreheads, then with their eyes; and, after kissing the cross, they move on."

To this day, the Eastern Churches, Catholic and Orthodox alike, celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on the September anniversary of the basilica's dedication. The feast entered the Western calendar in the seventh century after Emperor Heraclius recovered the cross from the Persians, who had carried it off in 614, 15 years earlier. According to the story, the emperor intended to carry the cross back into Jerusalem himself, but was unable to move forward until he took off his imperial garb and became a barefoot pilgrim.

#### Reflection

The cross is today the universal image of Christian belief. Countless generations of artists have turned it into a thing of beauty to be carried in procession or worn as jewelry. To the eyes of the first Christians, it had no beauty. It stood outside too many city walls, decorated only with decaying corpses, as a threat to anyone who defied Rome's authority—including Christians who refused sacrifice to Roman gods. Although believers spoke of the cross as the instrument of salvation, it seldom appeared in Christian art unless disguised as an anchor or the Chi-Rho until after Constantine's edict of toleration



#### THE BLESSING OF COMMUNITY

I have been blessed to be a member of my parish community for 28 years. For much of that time I was serving as a member of the parish staff, but it was still the community that I call home. I have been fortunate to be able to remain in that parish even as my life has encountered new chapters and callings. I am so grateful to God that I have been able to grow, be nourished, and find companionship in a parish for this long of a time

It is a natural tendency for human beings to desire belonging to something bigger than themselves. Not everyone is fortunate enough to find the community, big or small, that fulfills that need. Unfortunately, that means that many communities suffer from not having the benefit of the gifts, skills, and talents that any member can offer. Communities are in many ways living organisms that move and breathe based upon the individuals who form that body. A community is truly the sum of its parts.

Your parish community reflects you and everyone else in that community. The more each member gives to the community, the stronger that community finds itself. If you hold back, your community suffers, and you gain little. I know firsthand what being a part of a community can mean to a person. I would be no one at all - and you would not be reading this - if it weren't for the life I have had in my parish community.

It is that time again to register for 2023-2024 Religious Education Classes (CCD). Attached you will find the Registration Form. It is important that you complete all sections especially the EMERGENCY CONTACT Info. in the top right-hand corner. We must have a contact phone number and email address for you to provide you updated information throughout the school year.

# REGISTRATION PROCEDURES & REMINDERS Registration Form: Complete a Registration Form for each child in your family.

Sacramental Grades: 1st & 2nd, 8th & 9th. Preparation for the sacraments of Reconciliation & First Holy Communion and Confirmation is a two-year process. Therefore, students must complete first and second grade Religious Education classes before receiving First Holy Communion. Likewise, students must complete eighth and ninth grade classes before receiving Confirmation. The sacraments are a tremendous grace from God, which necessitate a thorough preparation before reception. If you have a child in grades 9-12 who did not attend Religious Education classes or a Catholic school last year, your child will need to enroll in our eighth-grade prep class this year. Please let us know if your child needs to be baptized, this is the first sacrament they must have prior to First Communion. We will make special arrangements to have your child baptized.

If your child is in 3rd grade or higher and has not yet received Reconciliation or First Holy Communion, they will need to enroll in their grade as well as the Sacramental Preparation Class. They will need to MEMORIZE the following prayers: Glory Be, Hail Mary, Our Father, Act of Contrition, Invitation to Communion & The Ten Commandments. Your child will be tested verbally along with written tests to ensure they know the prayers. So please begin now working with your child. Otherwise, a lot of time is taken during each class to ensure that all students know them individually. Please make sure you get a copy of the Prayer List and Parent Letter so your child comes to class already knowing the prayers!

Baptismal Certificates: Include a Baptismal Certificate for all students receiving a Sacrament (2nd grade: Reconciliation & First Holy Communion, 9th grade Confirmation)

Fee: \$25.00 per student and may be paid by credit card through the office or in cash or check made out to Emmanuel Catholic Church. You may make one check for multiple students, just list the students name on the notation part of the check. Please attach payment to the Registration Form.
