Jesus say's "where your treasure is, there is your heart." Now if you want to know what your heart is like, then you answer your own question. The heart hungers. It hungers for many things, but what it hungers for most is security. Everybody wants security.

There's no end to the money. It's really silly if you look at it: everybody running after money and getting money here and there, and it's not worth anything except to buy something else.

What is the thing that you treasure most, that you would never give up, that brings out in you, not an eagerness for money and success, but for love? If your treasure is God then your hear is in the right place. It's that simple.

Your heart's in the right place if you always remember that the greatest treasure is he sending his son all this way to tell you: "You are forgiven and loved and cared for and I am going to prove it, not just telling these stories, but by laying my life down for you."

And it is God who lays his life down out of love. Now this is a great treasure. And don't miss the chance.

There was a little girl in a big forest and she got separated from all the family that was picnicking in the forest and she got lost.

And so everybody ran searching all over the place for the little girl and they search all afternoon. Evening began and people began to go home and the only one left was the father. The father wouldn't give up. It was damp and the father is worried about the little girl. He doesn't know what he's going to do. What happened to the little girl? Well, she got tired of looking for the father and family and she found a nice grassy spot in the middle of the forest and it was open so she lay down and went to sleep. The father is screaming and yelling and calling and everything, and finally he tumbles onto the little area and his daughter wakes up and jumps up and she runs across to him. He's so happy and she jumps into his arms and she say's "I finally found you daddy." she thinks she found him and forgot all his troubles and all his tears and all his work.

"The fine pearl of great price" that Jesus speaks about represents you and me. The merchant represents God. Ever since the time we were born, God has treasured us as precious. And because we are precious, he sent his Son, Jesus, to offer up his life for us. This is what St. John tells us: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but shall have eternal life." (3:16).

So now we know. Jesus gave up his throne in heaven, became a man, and suffered on a cross in order to purchase you and me. Did he do this for worthless sinners? No, he did it for you and me, we who are precious in the sight of God.

Jesus also includes a cautionary message in the parable when he talks about the useless things that the fisherman threw away after hauling their nets to shore. In the same way, we must continuously polish our pearl and clean away the dust, that is, we must continue to grow in faith and holiness.

“Holy Child of Prague II” - From Fred Martz

The Holy Child of Prague II that rises above the steps to the Alter at Emmanuel Catholic Church is of historical significances.

It is a 1989 reproduction of the original 1956 Holy Child of Prague that was commissioned for the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception being built in Washington DC.

The 22inch 1956 sculpture is on permanent display in the lower crypt church of the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception.

The Cybis sculpture is undoubtedly one of the most delicately conceived porcelain figure to be found anywhere in the world.

Since the child is traditionally dressed in priceless garments of silk, brocade, embroidery, and lace, many times consuming processes and exhaustive experiments were involved in the sculpture creation.

The delicate transparency of silk was achieved by shaving the porcelain to rose petal thinness.

The extensive use of both 18k and 24k gold is a testament to the genius of the Cybis artist since each application of Gold requires another firing in the kiln and could easily "burn out" and require the need to "begin again" the multiple layering of porcelain to achieve the perfection that is Cybis.

Many of these artists were from Poland and other European Capitals of fine art. Finally, the Holy Child is a Blessing on the people of Emmanuel Church and ultimately for the greater Honor and Glory of the Almighty God.

Saint Ignatius of Loyola's Story - Feast Day July 31st

The founder of the Jesuits was on his way to military fame and fortune when a cannon ball shattered his leg. Because there were no books of romance on hand during his convalescence, Ignatius whiled away the time reading a life of Christ and lives of the saints. His conscience was deeply touched, and a long, painful turning to Christ began. Having seen the Mother of God in a vision, he made a pilgrimage to her shrine at Montserrat near Barcelona. He remained for almost a year at nearby Manresa, sometimes with the Dominicans, sometimes in a pauper's hospice, often in a cave in the hills praying. After a period of great peace of mind, he went through a harrowing trial of scruples. There was no comfort in anything—prayer, fasting, sacraments, penance. At length, his peace of mind returned.

It was during this year of conversion that Ignatius began to write down material that later became his greatest work, the *Spiritual Exercises*.

He finally achieved his purpose of going to the Holy Land, but could not remain, as he planned, because of the hostility of the Turks. Ignatius spent the next 11 years in various European universities, studying with great difficulty, beginning almost as a child. Like many others, his orthodoxy was questioned; Ignatius was twice jailed for brief periods.

In 1534, at the age of 43, he and six others—one of whom was Saint Francis Xavier—vowed to live in poverty and chastity and to go to the Holy Land. If this became impossible, they vowed to offer themselves to the apostolic service of the pope. The latter became the only choice. Four years later Ignatius made the association permanent. The new Society of Jesus was approved by Pope Paul III, and Ignatius was elected to serve as the first general.

When companions were sent on various missions by the pope, Ignatius remained in Rome, consolidating the new venture, but still finding time to found homes for orphans, catechumens, and penitents. He founded the Roman College, intended to be the model of all other colleges of the Society.

Ignatius was a true mystic. He centered his spiritual life on the essential foundations of Christianity—the Trinity, Christ, the Eucharist. His spirituality is expressed in the Jesuit motto, *Ad maiorem Dei gloriam*—"for the greater glory of God." In his concept, obedience was to be the prominent virtue, to assure the effectiveness and mobility of his men. All activity was to be guided by a true love of the Church and unconditional obedience to the Holy Father, for which reason all professed members took a fourth vow to go wherever the pope should send them for the salvation of souls.

Reflection

Luther nailed his theses to the church door at Wittenberg in 1517. Seventeen years later, Ignatius of Loyola founded the Society that was to play so prominent a part in the Catholic Reformation. He was an implacable foe of Protestantism. Yet the seeds of ecumenism may be found in his words: "Great care must be taken to show forth orthodox truth in such a way that if any heretics happen to be present they may have an example of charity and Christian moderation. No hard words should be used nor any sort of contempt for their errors be shown." One of the greatest ecumenists was the 20th-century German Jesuit, Cardinal Augustin Bea.

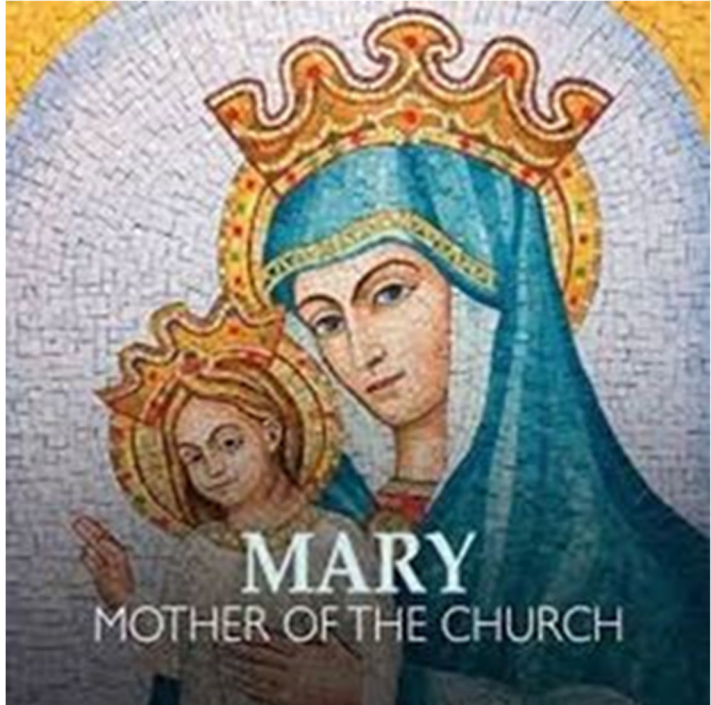

Diocese of Palm Beach Phased Reopening of Churches

Diocese of Palm Beach Catholics are dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass until further notice. This is meant to ensure the well-being and safety of all, not only the elderly and those who are at risk for illness, but anyone of any age who is making a prudent decision about their own well-being as well as that of others. Faithful are invited to continue to enjoy the weekly Televised Catholic Mass or attend their parish during the hours they are open.

Diocese of Palm Beach Phased Reopening of Churches and Safety Protocols:

- Wear facemasks during the Sacrament of Reconciliation and in your parish (with the exception of reception of Holy Communion).
- Social distancing will be observed, with spacing of 6 feet and use of every other pew (except for families and couples).
- Hand sanitizers and safety wipes should be used.
- There will be no reception of the Precious Blood or sign of peace, greeting of peace or holding of hands during the Our Father.
