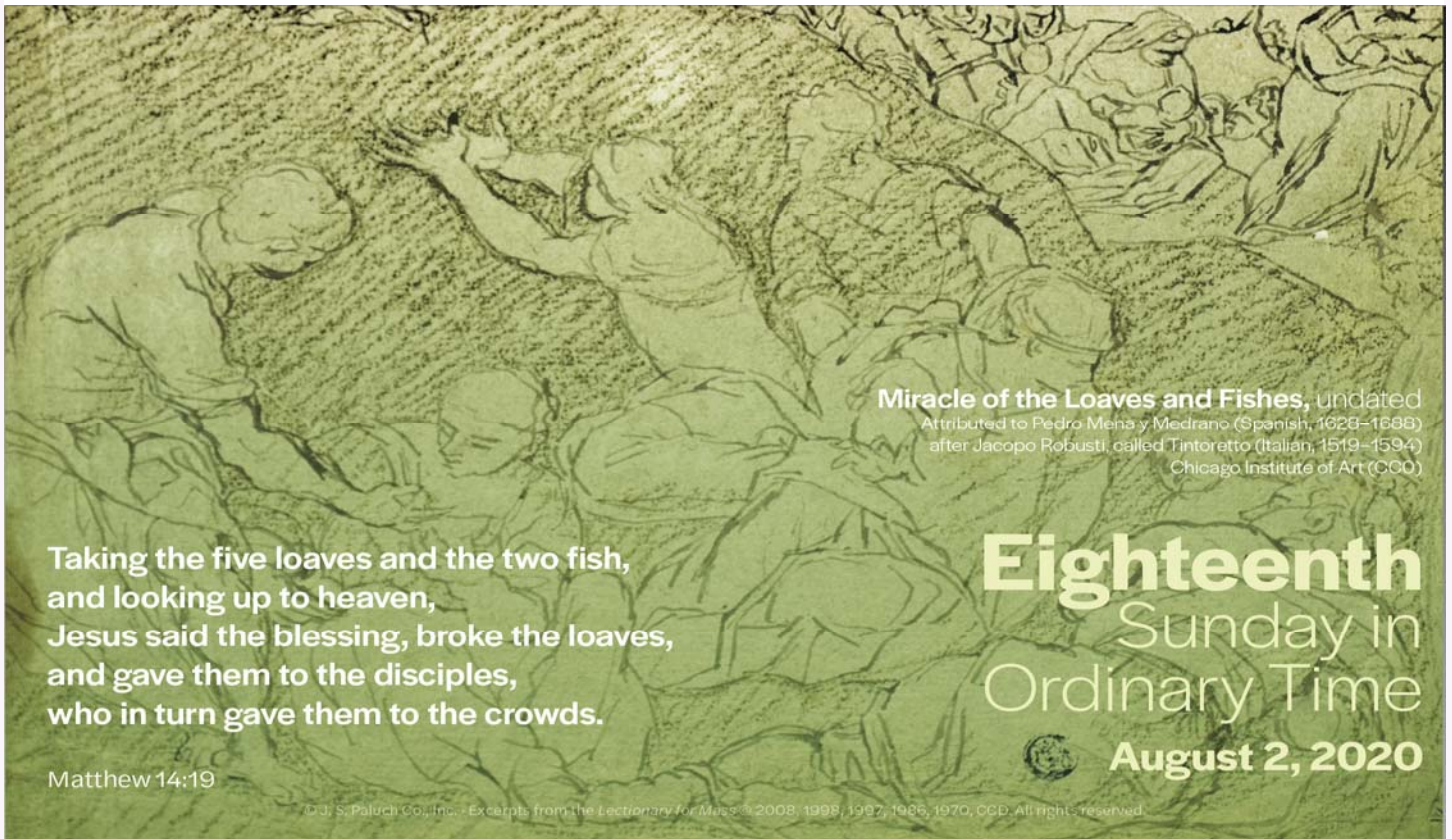

Eighteenth Sunday In Ordinary Time (A)

August 2nd, 2020

Is 55: 1-3 / Ps 145: 8-9, 15-18 / Rom 8: 35, 37-39 / Mt 14: 13-21

One guiding principle in sharing the Good News is never to preach to an empty stomach. Our intense desire to satisfy the spiritual hunger of our brethren should not dull our sensitivity to their material needs. Thus, we must feed both their bodies and souls.

Today Jesus emphasizes this principle as He feeds five thousand men with what His disciples have —five loaves and two fish. Looking at this particular episode of the Gospel, we may say that it was not Jesus alone who performs the miracle. Jesus and His disciples miraculously feed the multitude. That Jesus multiplies the bread and fish does not constitute the miracle. That is so ordinary for Jesus to do. He is the Son of God. He has the power to do anything. Miracles, from the perspective of God, are not miracles at all. They are blessings that are so ordinary for Him to dispense because He is not only omnipotent, but also overflowing with love.

The miracle begins when the disciples refuse to hide what they can otherwise selfishly keep for their own consumption. The miracle happens when they bring to Jesus the little they have. The miracle is when they become compassionate enough toward the crowd and share with it their five loaves and two fish.

Many people pray for miracles. Many wait for miracles to happen in their lives. Many people seek the intercession of the saints for miracles. But what are miracles? Who can perform miracles? I once read this claim: believe in miracles and they all begin with an act of love." Miracles are deeds of love. When we love we can also make miracles. The more we love, the more miracles we make. We can make miracles by the power of our love!

It is love that feeds both the body and the soul. If we have love then we can simultaneously satisfy the spiritual and physical hungers of our brethren. The reason why the souls of many people are hungry is because there is little love we put in our proclamation of the Gospel. The reason why still many are starving is because we have not loved enough.

Love like Jesus as that is what evangelization basically means. Love like Jesus that is the secret in feeding the hungry. Love like Jesus ...that is the power behind every miracle. When we love like Jesus miracles happen. Make a miracle today!

Saint of the Week

Saint John Vianney's Story - From Franciscan Media

A man with vision overcomes obstacles and performs deeds that seem impossible. John Vianney was a man with vision: He wanted to become a priest. But he had to overcome his meager formal schooling, which inadequately prepared him for seminary studies.

His failure to comprehend Latin lectures forced him to discontinue. But his vision of being a priest urged him to seek private tutoring. After a lengthy battle with the books, John was ordained.

Situations calling for "impossible" deeds followed him everywhere. As pastor of the parish at Ars, John encountered people who were indifferent and quite comfortable with their style of living. His vision led him through severe fasts and short nights of sleep.

With Catherine Lassagne and Benedicta Lardet, he established La Providence, a home for girls. Only a man of vision could have such trust that God would provide for the spiritual and material needs of all those who came to make La Providence their home.

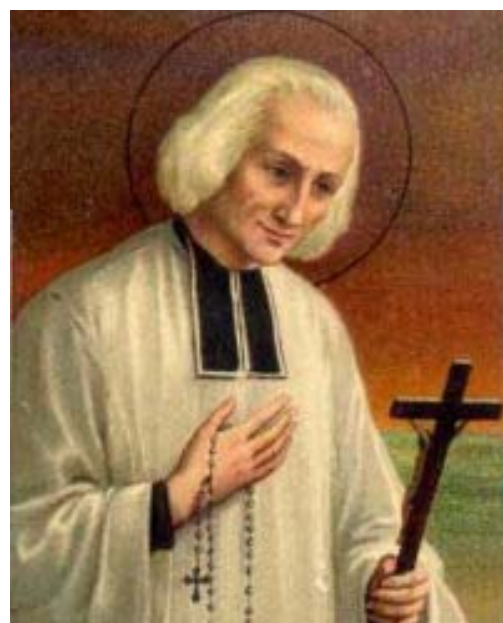
His work as a confessor is John Vianney's most remarkable accomplishment. In the winter months he was to spend 11 to 12 hours daily reconciling people with God. In the summer months this time was increased to 16 hours. Unless a man was dedicated to his vision of a priestly vocation, he could not have endured this giving of self day after day.

Many people look forward to retirement and taking it easy, doing the things they always wanted to do but never had the time. But John Vianney had no thoughts of retirement. As his fame spread, more hours were consumed in serving God's people. Even the few hours he would allow himself for sleep were disturbed frequently by the devil.

Who, but a man with vision, could keep going with ever-increasing strength? In 1929, Pope Pius XI named him the patron of parish priests worldwide.

Reflection

Indifference toward religion, coupled with a love for material comfort, seem to be common signs of our times. A person from another planet observing us would not likely judge us to be pilgrim people, on our way to somewhere else. John Vianney on the other hand, was a man on a journey, with his goal before him at all times.

Diocese of Palm Beach Phased Reopening of Churches

Diocese of Palm Beach Catholics are dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass until further notice. This is meant to ensure the well-being and safety of all, not only the elderly and those who are at risk for illness, but anyone of any age who is making a prudent decision about their own well-being as well as that of others. Faithful are invited to continue to enjoy the weekly Televised Catholic Mass or attend their parish during the hours they are open.

Diocese of Palm Beach Phased Reopening of Churches and Safety Protocols:

- Wear facemasks during the Sacrament of Reconciliation and in your parish (with the exception of reception of Holy Communion).
- Social distancing will be observed, with spacing of 6 feet and use of every other pew (except for families and couples).
- Hand sanitizers and safety wipes should be used.
- There will be no reception of the Precious Blood or sign of peace, greeting of peace or holding of hands during the Our Father.
