Blessed John XXIII was pope during a difficult time. To have enough strength, he prayed every night before sleeping in front of 'the Blessed Sacrament. One night he was so overwhelmed by the problems that he said, "Lord, the church belongs to you. I am going to bed." That is what Jesus meant when he told Peter, "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the underworld will not prevail against it."

Today's gospel tells us that Jesus is the owner of the church. Neither Peter nor the disciples own the Church. Priests and bishops who think and act as if they own the church are like farm workers who think the farm belongs to them. We do not own the church, we belong to the Church. Peter is the corner stone and we are the stones with which the Church is built.

A famous stained glass artist was commissioned to make a huge portrait for the window of the cathedral in Chartres, France. He laid all the pieces he was going to use on the floor of the cathedral. Among these beautiful pieces of glass was a small, clear piece as big as a fingernail. As the portrait was assembled, that little piece remained on the floor. On the day of the window's unveiling the entire city gathered to witness the event. The artist pulled away the cloth and the crowd gasped at the beauty of the colorful window glowing in the sunlight. Then the crowd grew silent. Something was missing. The artist walked to where the little clear piece of glass lay, picked it up, and placed it in the portrait, right in the center of Jesus' eye. As the sun hit that little piece, it gave off a dazzling sparkle. The work of art was complete. In grand design of building the church of God, each one of could consider ourselves to be that piece of glass so small and yet so indispensable

The School of Christian Formation will be teaching a course on Ecclesiology starting on August 26.

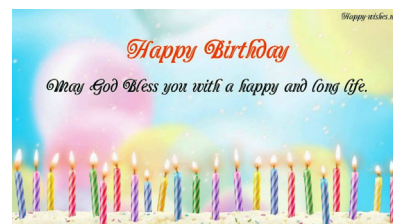

Saint of the Day for August 27

The circumstances of Saint Monica's life could have made her a nagging wife, a bitter daughter-in-law, and a despairing parent, yet she did not give way to any of these temptations. Although she was a Christian, her parents gave her in marriage to a pagan, Patricius, who lived in her hometown of Tagaste in North Africa. Patricius had some redeeming features, but he had a violent temper and was licentious. Monica also had to bear with a cantankerous mother-in-law who lived in her home. Patricius criticized his wife because of her charity and piety, but always respected her. Monica's prayers and example finally won her husband and mother-in-law to Christianity. Her husband died in 371, one year after his baptism.

Monica had at least three children who survived infancy. The oldest, Augustine, is the most famous. At the time of his father's death, Augustine was 17 and a rhetoric student in Carthage. Monica was distressed to learn that her son had accepted the Manichean heresy—"all flesh is evil"—and was living an immoral life. For a while, she refused to let him eat or sleep in her house. Then one night she had a vision that assured her Augustine would return to the faith. From that time on, she stayed close to her son, praying and fasting for him. In fact she often stayed much closer than Augustine wanted.

When he was 29, Augustine decided to go to Rome to teach rhetoric. Monica was determined to go along. One night he told his mother that he was going to the dock to say goodbye to a friend. Instead he set sail for Rome. Monica was heartbroken when she learned of Augustine's trick, but she still followed him. She arrived in Rome only to find that he had left for Milan. Although travel was difficult, Monica pursued him to Milan.

In Milan, Augustine came under the influence of the bishop, Saint Ambrose, who also became Monica's spiritual director. She accepted his advice in everything and had the humility to give up some practices that had become second nature to her. Monica became a leader of the devout women in Milan as she had been in Tagaste.

She continued her prayers for Augustine during his years of instruction. At Easter 387, Saint Ambrose baptized Augustine and several of his friends. Soon after, his party left for Africa. Although no one else was aware of it, Monica knew her life was near the end. She told Augustine, "Son, nothing in this world now affords me delight. I do not know what there is now left for me to do or why I am still here, all my hopes in this world being now fulfilled." She became ill shortly after and suffered severely for nine days before her death.

Almost all we know about St. Monica is in the writings of Saint Augustine, especially his *Confessions*.

Reflection

Today, with Google searches, online shopping, text messages, tweets, and instant credit, we have little patience for things that take time. Likewise, we want instant answers to our prayers. Monica is a model of patience. Her long years of prayer, coupled with a strong, well-disciplined character, finally led to the conversion of her hot-tempered husband, her cantankerous mother-in-law and her brilliant but wayward son, Augustine.

Part Two

Pope John XXIII was canonized a saint on April 27, 2014. He "47-1" brought the Church into the modern age. It is said that he opened the windows and doors of the church to bring in fresh air. He restored the role of the laity in church affairs. Unfortunately, many other reforms were not implemented by his successors for one reason or another. It wasn't until Pope Francis came to power that we had another visionary.

He is implementing the neglected reform issues from Vatican II.. So far Pope Francis' reforms are:

1) reduced greatly the power of the Roman Curia which is now subject to the Pope and the national bishops' conferences; 2) restored national Bishops' conferences power to settled their local problems without submitting them to the Vatican; 3) marriage annulments are to be settled within 45 days with no cost; 4) the Pope favors a married clergy under certain conditions; 5) the gospel ideas must supersede church laws; 6) people's consciences must be respected even when they are contrary to church laws; 7) women deacons issue to be discussed. 8) all theologians are free to express their ideas; 9) the hierarchy and all priests to live a moderate life style; 10) Pope Francis has appointed 65 moderate theological cardinals; 11) Pope Francis has made everyone aware of the poor, voiceless, and unwanted. He has opened food shelters on Vatican grounds and in Rome. He visits the poor slum areas in many countries. He has removed several cardinals who are ultra conservative and are opposed to his moderate progressive ideas. 12) he also placed the Vatican Bank under international laws like all banks.

Pope Francis' worse crisis is the pedophilia crisis. This crisis has ripped the Church apart. Because of a third of pedophile and coverup cardinals, bishops, and priests, church Mass attendance and finances have dropped. In particular, the majority of young people in group from 13 to 30 years old have left the church permanently. Pope Francis has enacted new laws for all Catholic dioceses in the world to end the pedophilia crisis. He asked the archbishops to establish boards to investigate pedophilia cases and report within 30 days to the Vatican. He suggested that they put lay members on these boards. The Vatican's decisions will be given within 45 days. He removed Vatican immunity for all Apostolic Nuncios (the Pope's representative in a country). It will be extended to all archbishops and bishops.

They will not be able to claim Vatican immunity if they are accused of a crime.

Pope Francis' Papacy can be summarized in one word, EVANGELIZATION.

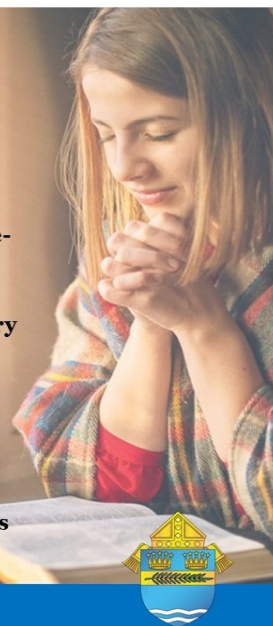


Diocese of Palm Beach Phased Reopening of Churches

Diocese of Palm Beach Catholics are dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass until further notice. This is meant to ensure the well-being and safety of all, not only the elderly and those who are at risk for illness, but anyone of any age who is making a prudent decision about their own well-being as well as that of others. Faithful are invited to continue to enjoy the weekly Televised Catholic Mass or attend their parish during the hours they are open.

Diocese of Palm Beach Phased Reopening of Churches and Safety Protocols:

- Wear facemasks during the Sacrament of Reconciliation and in your parish (with the exception of reception of Holy Communion).
- Social distancing will be observed, with spacing of 6 feet and use of every other pew (except for families and couples).
- Hand sanitizers and safety wipes should be used.
- There will be no reception of the Precious Blood or sign of peace, greeting of peace or holding of hands during the Our Father.
