The Joy of the Lord Is Your Strength

Around the year 515 B.C., some of the Jews who had been exiled to Babylonia returned to Jerusalem. Then, thanks especially to the efforts of two men, Ezra, a Jewish priest, and Nehemiah, a leader who supervised the reconstruction of the walls of Jerusalem, the people began to rebuild the city. It was very difficult for they had little money. There were also certain enemies who opposed them. And much of the city had been destroyed amid all this, Nehemiah called all the people together. Then he said something very impressive: "Do not be sad: the joy of the Lord is your strength" (Ne. 8:10).

Is not what Nehemiah said very true: the joy of the Lord is your strength." When we are upset, or flurried, or worried, we become weak. But when we are joyful, we are strong. When we are happy, we are able to accomplish our work and do what is necessary in our daily life. It is significant that Jesus speaks in the same terms. Even when he refers to the cross, he is positive. "Whoever loses his life for my sake," he says, will find it." The cost is very high: at times we must give up the urge to do what we want to do. Rather, we must constantly try to find out what God wants us to do; then, when we come to know His will, we must go ahead resolutely and do it. But it is precisely in this way that we find ourselves and, in finding ourselves, create joy in our life.

It is paradoxical, but I believe that we can do even difficult things with a sense of joy. In the same way, we can deal with suffering with a sense of joy. In everything we can be joyful. Why? Because we know that God loves us and that He can bring about a good end to everything that happens in our life. And so our joy is something that is based on a firm foundation God's love for us and His continuous guidance in our life.

Our burdens and crosses can be compared to a large bundle of wood, too heavy for us to carry. But God does not require us to carry the whole bundle at once. What he does is to untie the bundle and give us first one stick, which we carry today, and then another, which we carry tomorrow, and so on. In this way we can easily manage if we only take the burden appointed for us each day. The problem, however, is we have the habit of in-creasing our burden by carrying the stick we carried yesterday, and add it to our burden today, including tomorrow's burden even if we are not asked yet to carry it today. This is why sometimes we complain to God that he is giving us a cross beyond our capacity to bear. cannot be unfair to us. God does not try us beyond strength.

Christ said: "Do not worry about tomorrow for to-morrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own" (Mt.6:34). Do not be afraid. Do not be discouraged. As we pray each day, we grow in our trust in God every day. As we carry our cross each day, we grow in our total commitment to Christ every day. Let it be accordingly, every day.

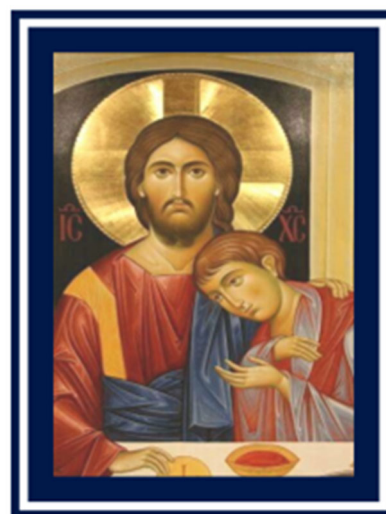
School of Christian Formation

Saint of the Week

Mother Teresa - St Teresa of Calcutta's Story - Feast day September 5

Mother Teresa of Calcutta, the tiny woman recognized throughout the world for her work among the poorest of the poor, was beatified October 19, 2003. Among those present were hundreds of Missionaries of Charity, the order she founded in 1950, as a diocesan religious community. Today the congregation also includes contemplative sisters and brothers and an order of priests.

Born to Albanian parents in what is now Skopje, Macedonia, Gonxha (Agnes) Bojaxhiu was the youngest of the three children who survived. For a time, the family lived comfortably, and her father's construction business thrived. But life changed overnight following his unexpected death.

During her years in public school, Agnes participated in a Catholic sodality and showed a strong interest in the foreign missions. At age 18, she entered the Loreto Sisters of Dublin. It was 1928 when she said goodbye to her mother for the final time and made her way to a new land and a new life. The following year she was sent to the Loreto novitiate in Darjeeling, India. There she chose the name Teresa and prepared for a life of service. She was assigned to a high school for girls in Calcutta, where she taught history and geography to the daughters of the wealthy. But she could not escape the realities around her—the poverty, the suffering, the overwhelming numbers of destitute people.

In 1946, while riding a train to Darjeeling to make a retreat, Sister Teresa heard what she later explained as “a call within a call. The message was clear. I was to leave the convent and help the poor while living among them.” She also heard a call to give up her life with the Sisters of Loreto and instead, to “follow Christ into the slums to serve him among the poorest of the poor.”

After receiving permission to leave Loreto, establish a new religious community, and undertake her new work, Sister Teresa took a nursing course for several months. She returned to Calcutta, where she lived in the slums and opened a school for poor children. Dressed in a white sari and sandals—the ordinary dress of an Indian woman—she soon began getting to know her neighbors—especially the poor and sick—and getting to know their needs through visits.

The work was exhausting, but she was not alone for long. Volunteers who came to join her in the work, some of them former students, became the core of the Missionaries of Charity. Others helped by donating food, clothing, supplies, and the use of buildings. In 1952, the city of Calcutta gave Mother Teresa a former hostel, which became a home for the dying and the destitute. As the order expanded, services were also offered to orphans, abandoned children, alcoholics, the aging, and street people.

For the next four decades, Mother Teresa worked tirelessly on behalf of the poor. Her love knew no bounds. Nor did her energy, as she crisscrossed the globe pleading for support and inviting others to see the face of Jesus in the poorest of the poor. In 1979, she was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. On September 5, 1997, God called her home. Blessed Teresa was canonized by Pope Francis on September 4, 2016.



Reflection

Mother Teresa's beatification, just over six years after her death, was part of an expedited process put into effect by Pope John Paul II. Like so many others around the world, he found her love for the Eucharist, for prayer, and for the poor a model for all to emulate.

Diocese of Palm Beach Phased Reopening of Churches

Diocese of Palm Beach Catholics are dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass until further notice. This is meant to ensure the well-being and safety of all, not only the elderly and those who are at risk for illness, but anyone of any age who is making a prudent decision about their own well-being as well as that of others. Faithful are invited to continue to enjoy the weekly Televised Catholic Mass or attend their parish during the hours they are open.

Diocese of Palm Beach Phased Reopening of Churches and Safety Protocols:

- Wear facemasks during the Sacrament of Reconciliation and in your parish (with the exception of reception of Holy Communion).
- Social distancing will be observed, with spacing of 6 feet and use of every other pew (except for families and couples).
- Hand sanitizers and safety wipes should be used.
- There will be no reception of the Precious Blood or sign of peace, greeting of peace or holding of hands during the Our Father.
