## The Value of Work

In Genesis, we find something very significant. When God created Adam and Eve, He said to them: "Be fruitful, multiply, fill the earth and conquer it" (1:28). Then, a few verses later, we read: "The Lord God took the man and settled him in the Garden of Eden to cultivate and take care of it" (2:15). After that, however, the trouble started: a serpent appeared to Eve, tempted her, and she fell just as Adam did soon afterwards. One of the important points here is that God gave Adam and Eve some work to do. He put them in the garden and told them to cultivate and care for it. However, they were not so faithful in doing this. Instead of working hard and taking good care of the garden, they thought leisurely about how they might improve their lot. Perhaps they even thought of how they could get more power and less work. And so, they disobeyed God and ate the fruit from the forbidden tree.

In the Gospel today we see something quite similar. Using allegory, Matthew makes some comparisons. The vineyard is Israel. The owner of the vineyard is God. After He sets up the vineyard, God sends His servants, the prophets, in order to get the fruit of the vineyard. But the tenants, that is, the religious leaders of the Jews, abuse and kill them. They even kill the landowner's son, who, of course, is Jesus.

It is our actions that actually end up condemning us and making our lives to be a mess-not God. So many of the great theologians and saints have said in their writing that God condemns no one. Rather we condemn ourselves by the choices we make. Choose God and pray to God with complete confidence. If we reject God, he cannot go against our own free will which he gave us. God's choice is always love. Our choice is up to us.

The story also tells us a lot about work. According to Genesis, when God created the world, He was very busy. First, He made light; then plants and animals and birds, and so on. Even in the story today, the landowner, God, is also very busy. He plants a vineyard, then he makes a fence; he digs a deep hole to have a place to press the grapes, and, finally, he builds a tower. The tenants, that is, the Jewish priests and scholars, don't do anything. Why? Well, maybe they're just too lazy. All they think about, and all they want are the profits from the vineyard.

Be as it may, one of the themes in the Gospel, I think, is the value and the importance of work. Work is good for us. And there are many practical rewards. Work, of course, brings a salary, which enables us to live a decent life. Moreover, when we work hard, we feel satisfaction, knowing that we are developing our talents and skills as we do our job. But beyond all this, by working hard we give glory and honor to God. It is as if we are using all the talents He gave us and, in doing so, mature and become the kind of person He wants us to be. Let us thank God for helping us find work. And let us do our best as we work, offering everything to God.

### Religious Education

Hello Families,

We are eager to begin our 2020-2021 Religious Education Program. Registration is open and available online on the Emmanuel Website. You may also fill a form out by visiting the office during office hours.

Emmanuel Catholic Church along with the Diocese has worked diligently to develop a re-opening plan that allows our families and students to return to class and the Children's Mass. Our first Children's Mass will be at 10:00am on September 20<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Our Children's Masses will follow the protocols in place by the diocese and will take place in Columbus Hall to allow seating to accommodate families and social distancing measures. We kindly request that all families use hand sanitizer as they enter Columbus Hall and follow guidelines for wearing masks.

Our classes for Kindergarten through fifth grade will also begin on September 20<sup>th</sup>. Grades 6<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> (Confirmation class) will begin October 11<sup>th</sup> and follow the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of the month schedule as in the past.

Our classrooms will be assigned based on student numbers and seating arranged to limit face to face contact. All teachers and students will be required to use hand sanitizer as they enter the classroom as well as have their temperature screened. Anyone with a temperature higher than 100.2 degrees will be sent home. Families are expected to screen their children for a fever and other potential symptoms before coming to Mass and Religious Education classes. All students must wear face masks and adhere to social distancing guidelines while in the classroom.

Enhanced cleaning protocols have been established to disinfect the classroom areas daily. Carl will be present on Sundays to handle cleaning high-touch surface areas between classes especially during the Sundays we have the transition of the Elementary School students to Middle School and H.S. students. We will provide the necessary cleaning and disinfecting supplies for teachers to use as needed.

This plan and any other related policies and procedures may be revised at any time. We look forward to our students return and we look forward to walking this journey of faith with them.

May God bless you and may he always be at your side and walk with you as you navigate through these changing times.

## Saint of the Week

### Saint Francis Assisi Saint of the Day for October 4th Saint Francis of Assisi's Story

The patron saint of Italy, Francis of Assisi, was a poor little man who astounded and inspired the Church by taking the gospel literally—not in a narrow fundamentalist sense, but by actually following all that Jesus said and did, joyfully, without limit, and without a sense of self-importance.

Serious illness brought the young Francis to see the emptiness of his frolicking life as leader of Assisi's youth. Prayer—lengthy and difficult—led him to a self-emptying like that of Christ, climaxed by embracing a leper he met on the road. It symbolized his complete obedience to what he had heard in prayer: "Francis! Everything you have loved and desired in the flesh it is your duty to despise and hate, if you wish to know my will. And when you have begun this, all that now seems sweet and lovely to you will become intolerable and bitter, but all that you used to avoid will turn itself to great sweetness and exceeding joy."

From the cross in the neglected field-chapel of San Damiano, Christ told him, "Francis, go out and build up my house, for it is nearly falling down." Francis became the totally poor and humble workman.

He must have suspected a deeper meaning to "build up my house." But he would have been content to be for the rest of his life the poor "nothing" man actually putting brick on brick in abandoned chapels. He gave up all his possessions, piling even his clothes before his earthly father—who was demanding restitution for Francis' "gifts" to the poor—so that he would be totally free to say, "Our Father in heaven." He was, for a time, considered to be a religious fanatic, begging from door to door when he could not get money for his work, evoking sadness or disgust to the hearts of his former friends, ridicule from the unthinking.

But genuineness will tell. A few people began to realize that this man was actually trying to be Christian. He really believed what Jesus said: "Announce the kingdom! Possess no gold or silver or copper in your purses, no traveling bag, no sandals, no staff" (Luke 9:1-3).

Francis' first rule for his followers was a collection of texts from the Gospels. He had no intention of founding an order, but once it began he protected it and accepted all the legal structures needed to support it. His devotion and loyalty to the Church were absolute and highly exemplary at a time when various movements of reform tended to break the Church's unity.

Francis was torn between a life devoted entirely to prayer and a life of active preaching of the Good News. He decided in favor of the latter, but always returned to solitude when he could. He wanted to be a missionary in Syria or in Africa, but was prevented by shipwreck and illness in both cases. He did try to convert the sultan of Egypt during the Fifth Crusade.

During the last years of his relatively short life, he died at 44, Francis was half blind and seriously ill. Two years before his death he received the stigmata, the real and painful wounds of Christ in his hands, feet and side.

On his deathbed, Francis said over and over again the last addition to his *Canticle of the Sun*, "Be praised, O Lord, for our Sister Death." He sang Psalm 141, and at the end asked his superior's permission to have his clothes removed when the last hour came in order that he could expire lying naked on the earth, in imitation of his Lord.

#### Reflection

Francis of Assisi was poor only that he might be Christ-like. He recognized creation as another manifestation of the beauty of God. In 1979, he was named patron of ecology. He did great penance—apologizing to "Brother Body" later in life—that he might be totally disciplined for the will of God. Francis' poverty had a sister, Humility, by which he meant total dependence on the good God. But all this was, as it were, preliminary to the heart of his spirituality: living the gospel life, summed up in the charity of Jesus and perfectly expressed in the Eucharist.

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

*Respect Life Sunday* this year coincides with the Feast of Saint Francis of Assisi. He is a fitting patron for us in regard to his respect for all of God's creation of which the culmination is the human person made in His image and likeness. *Respect Life Sunday* also falls during the year of the 25th anniversary of the encyclical of Saint John Paul II, *Evangelium Vitae, The Gospel of Life*. He gave us this great gift on the Solemnity of the Annunciation, March 25, 1995. Indeed, through Mary's yes to God's will, the Son of God became incarnate in her womb at the moment of conception.

Saint Pope John Paul II's encyclical begins with the words, "The Gospel of life is at the heart of Jesus' message." To our society today, faced with a great deal of threats to life and misunderstandings of its dignity, it is necessary to proclaim the sanctity of life from the moment of conception until natural death. So many of the world's critical problems would be put in proper perspective with a fundamental respect for the gift of life at every stage.

The need to promote the dignity of all life is imperative but, at this particular political time, even more so for that of an unborn child. Horrific abortion legislation within various states has gone far beyond *Roe v. Wade*, while tax dollars continue to be proposed to fund abortions.

In his apostolic exhortation, *Gaudete et Exsultate*, Pope Francis clearly stated that, "Our defense of the innocent unborn needs to be clear, firm and passionate for at stake is the dignity of the human life, which is always sacred and demands love for each person, regardless of his or her stage of development." On one occasion the Pope expressed, "Last century, the whole world was scandalized by what the Nazis did to purify the race. Today, we do the same thing but with white gloves!" As the United States Bishops have stated so clearly in *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, "The common outcry, which is justly made on behalf of human rights – for example, the right to health, to home, to work, to family, to culture – is false and illusory if the right to life, the most basic and fundamental right, and the condition for all other personal rights, is not defended with maximum determination."

I wish to express my deep gratitude to the faithful of our Diocese for their staunch and loyal support in fostering respect for life at every stage. The present election time is a critical one and needs our prayers, attention and action in a special way, particularly in fostering protection of the unborn.
