## Be Wise

Jesus speaks about ten virgins who are about to attend a wedding feast. Five of the virgins are wise, so they take extra oil with them in case the oil in their torches runs out. But the other five are foolish since they do not bother to take any extra oil with them. Thus, when the bridegroom arrives, the foolish virgins, all in a flutter, run off to buy some more oil, since their lamps are going out. However, it is precisely then that the groom arrives. Having bought the oil, the foolish virgins return and beg to be admitted into the wedding hall. But the door is closed, so they cannot enter. They are too late.

Psalm 63, our Responsorial Psalm, expresses well the theme of this Sunday -longing for God. The truly wise know that the world cannot offer anything truly lasting and valuable. The only true treasure is God, to be with God, to be counted among the Blessed Ones (remember November 1). It is wise to remember that we will all die and those who have remained faithful will, at the resurrection of the dead, will rise to meet the Lord (2nd reading).

We are all “Virgins!” We could either be wise or foolish virgins! The wise are vigilant, watchful. The wise wait in joyful anticipation, with great longing, for the advent of the Bridegroom, our Lord.

In Biblical parlance, notice that the opposite of a wise man is not a dumb or dull person, but a fool. Being wise has nothing to do with intelligence. A wise man is one who knows the things that really matter and pursues them perseveringly without let up. A wise person notes the experiences he has through life and learns from them.

We therefore can say that such a person is one who would not pass through a bad road a second time. Because he would have learned from that experience and therefore do everything within the limits of prudence to avoid passing through that road again.

On the other hand, a fool may not even remember passing through that road before. Or in case he remembers, he may have not learned anything from the experience or had forgotten it already. Incidentally, this is a very prevalent character trait among us. We never learn our lessons: from experience, from history, from established aged old norms of doing things correctly.

We keep maintaining bad company, bad diet, bad hobbies, etc. We never learn.

Another quality of a wise person is foresight. Just like the ten virgins in our gospel for today, humanity is divided into two groups, those with foresight and those with none. But foresight is such an essential in life, both in spiritual and corporeal life. Without foresight, we will never grow much spiritually; similarly, without foresight, we are bound to fail in life. Businesses succeed because of their owners' capacity to see what is well beyond the horizon. They are several steps ahead when they plan their affairs. Chess players win games because of their ability to map out their game, plan ahead and to think several moves ahead of their opponent. Similarly, life has to do with foresight. But it takes a wise man, not necessarily just an intelligent one, to see which road leads one to life, which experience brings one to fulfillment, what things are really of value.

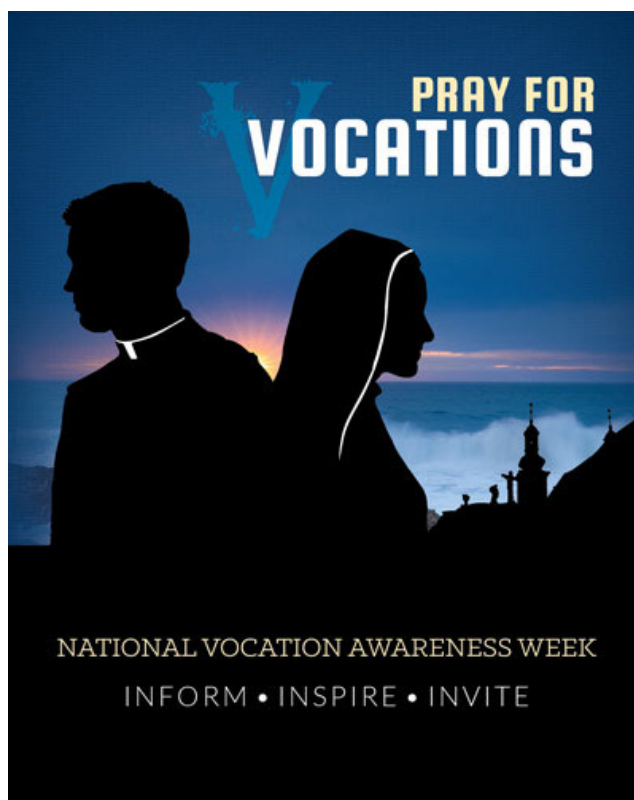

### National Vocation Awareness week

Sunday November 1st begins Vocation Awareness week. Did you know that in our country, compared to 60 years ago there are 20,000 fewer priests and 129,000 fewer religious sisters? At the same time the catholic church population has grown steadily. During vocation awareness week, please pray that young people in today's society will hear and respond to God's call. And do your part to encourage them to consider the priesthood and religious life.

**One vocation leads to another.** "Let us not forget that Christian marriage is a vocation to holiness in the full sense of the word, and that the example of holy parents is the first condition favorable for the flowering of priestly and religious vocations." - Pope Benedict XVI

**Your Unique Mission.** Why does it matter that people discover their God-given vocation? Because the church relies on the unique contribution of every soul. As St. John Henry Newman famously reflected: "God has created me to do some special service; God has committed some work to me which has not been committed to another. I have a mission."



### Saint Leo the Great's Story

With apparent strong conviction of the importance of the Bishop of Rome in the Church, and of the Church as the ongoing sign of Christ's presence in the world, Leo the Great displayed endless dedication as pope. Elected in 440, he worked tirelessly as "Peter's successor," guiding his fellow bishops as "equals in the episcopacy and infirmities."

Leo is known as one of the best administrative popes of the ancient Church. His work branched into four main areas, indicative of his notion of the pope's total responsibility for the flock of Christ. He worked at length to control the heresies of Pelagianism—overemphasizing human freedom—Manichaeism—seeing everything material as evil—and others, placing demands on their followers so as to secure true Christian beliefs.

A second major area of his concern was doctrinal controversy in the Church in the East, to which he responded with a classic letter setting down the Church's teaching on the two natures of Christ. With strong faith, he also led the defense of Rome against barbarian attack, taking the role of peacemaker.

In these three areas, Leo's work has been highly regarded. His growth to sainthood has its basis in the spiritual depth with which he approached the pastoral care of his people, which was the fourth focus of his work. He is known for his spiritually profound sermons. An instrument of the call to holiness, well-versed in Scripture and ecclesiastical awareness, Leo had the ability to reach the everyday needs and interests of his people. One of his sermons is used in the Office of Readings on Christmas.

It is said of Leo that his true significance rests in his doctrinal insistence on the mysteries of Christ and the Church and in the supernatural charisms of the spiritual life given to humanity in Christ and in his Body, the Church. Thus Leo held firmly that everything he did and said as pope for the administration of the Church represented Christ, the head of the Mystical Body, and Saint Peter, in whose place Leo acted.

#### Reflection

At a time when there is widespread criticism of Church structures, we also hear criticism that bishops and priests—indeed, all of us—are too preoccupied with administration of temporal matters. Pope Leo is an example of a great administrator who used his talents in areas where spirit and structure are inseparably combined: doctrine, peace, and pastoral care. He avoided an "angelism" that tries to live without the body, as well as the "practicality" that deals only in externals.
