THE DAY OF THE LORD

In the Old Testament, the Day of the Lord has been pictured as a terrible day, a day that people would probably duck in fear to escape its horrors. First, it would come suddenly and unexpectedly. It would come when everyone else is thinking about other things. This being the case, it is highly suspect of some people to announce that this or that decade or year shall be the end of the world.

Second, the Day of the Lord would involve a cosmic upheaval. This is frightening, and the fact that this would come upon us so suddenly and unexpectedly adds to its horrors, for nobody can be prepared for such a calamity. An earthquake alone already unnerves us, how much more a catastrophe of this magnitude.

Third, the Day of the Lord would be a time of judgment day, according to Matthew, is the day of reckoning, wherein people all over the world, living and dead, will be judged based on how they played the role given them by God. Those found worthy shall be placed on the side of the redeemed. But those found wanting shall be sent to the everlasting flames. They had their chance; but they didn't grab it.

But these characteristics of the Day of the Lord should in no way frighten us to despair. We are not completely hopeless or powerless. In fact, salvation can be in our hands if we allow ourselves to be warned. We know that human existence in this world is not forever. We are taught that we are just passersby. A wise tenant of this world should not attach himself to its values, for it is not that way in the afterlife. St. Paul then reminds us to stay awake to welcome the Day of the Lord. For him, there should be no reason for the Christian to be caught unawares even if it comes to us like a thief in the night.

It is only the man who lives in the dark and whose deeds are evil who will be caught unprepared. For a Christian who is true to his name, that is, the one who uses well the talents given him by God, lives in the light and no matter when that day comes, if he is watchful and sober, it will find him ready. For such a Christian, the Day of the Lord would not be a Day of wailing and grinding of teeth; but a Day of great rejoicing. And so, be prepared.

Take the counsel of the wise: "It is too late to prepare for an examination when the examination paper is before you. It is too late to make the house secure when the storm has burst. The man who has lived all his life with Christ is never unprepared to enter his nearer presence."

DEDICATION TO PETER AND PAUL

Today we remember the Dedication of the two Basilicas named in honor of the two greatest Apostles: The Basilica of St. Peter, built on the Vatican Hill, and the Basilica of St. Paul, built along the Ostian Way, near the place where he was beheaded.

But our celebration is not only a commemoration of that day in the fourth century when these Churches were dedicated in honor of these Apostles. They deserve better than that from us. Thus, our celebration should take the form of a dedication, not anymore of a building or structure, but of our commitment and loyalty to these Apostles and to the Church which they had so vigorously defended against enemies to the point of giving their lives.

Peter and Paul were the most notable victims of the persecution of Christians during the first century which was started by Nero in the year 64 AD. It is said that their Basilicas have been visited for almost two millennia by more pilgrims than any other place on earth. The bishops all over the world periodically (every five years) pay their visit to these Basilicas in order to visit the Tomb of the Apostles and to renew their commitments to the service of Christ and of his Church.

For the Muslims, their pilgrim place is Mecca. It is the life time dream of every Muslim to visit the place before they die. For us Christians, it is Rome. It is there where we can connect historically, even if it be in a forth of emotional nostalgia, to the roots of our faith the Apostles. But since not every one of us can be given a chance to do so, there are other ways of professing our commitment and dedication to the apostles and to the cause which they had died for the faith.

We can start by involving ourselves in parish or community activities that promote the authentic faith which we have inherited from the Apostles. We may not be able to go to Rome, or to build a Church in honor of St. Peter or St. Paul, but we can dedicate our lives to them by being good Christians ourselves and by sharing our talents in the service of our local Church.
