

God was silent after the death of the last of the writing prophets. The Jews took the silence to mean that the spirit of prophecy had been quenched and only by the echo of His voice could God be heard. John the Baptist's voice broke the silence. John the Baptist was the voice of God but he was not God's word.

John the Baptist was at the service of Jesus just as the voice finds its fulfillment in having a word to announce. It was with a glad heart that John bid his disciples to follow Jesus that they might be disciples of the Word whose voice he was. John the Baptist was the most privileged among all the prophets. He did not only speak about the Messiah; he pointed to the Messiah as he spoke: "Behold the Lamb of God." He was not only the voice of the Word; he was also the hand that showed the way to the Word.


As the birthday of Jesus approaches, let us be more conscious of the fact that ours is also a ministry of being the voice and hand that leads to Jesus:

J – Joyful. We attract people when we are filled with joy in whatever circumstances we are in. But remember that only authentic joy inspires people to seek what we have in our hearts. That whom we have in our hearts is Jesus, the source of our deepest joy because we know that He works for the good of those who love Him.

O – We need to develop a sense of openness to God's grace. We must also remain open to the movement of God's grace in the lives of other people. This is most especially true with regards people whose attitude and lifestyle appall us because they are seemingly ungodly. St. Augustine once said, "Since God became human, we can be sure that in everything human there is something of the divine."

 \mathbf{H} – Holy. Words are powerful but the power of our personal example is the best catching force. Our personal holiness wins more souls than anything. By holiness we mean love, for Scriptures define holiness as the perfection of charity.

N – Nothing. Yes, strive to be nothing! So that God may be everything in your life. If love were a game, the score of your life needs to be always zero in favor of God. Let Him always score in your life. Let Him win the game. Let Jesus, in the spirit of Bl. Teresa of Calcutta's prayer, be the light that shines in and through you. Like John the Baptist, decrease so that Jesus may increase. Let us be like John the Baptist. If we strive to be like him, we shall be the voice and hand that bring many souls to the Lord. When His birthday comes, your gift to Jesus will be more precious than gold.

Advent Wreath

Traditionally, Advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, representing the four weeks of advent. Ideally, three candles are purple and one is rose. The purple candle in particular symbolize the prayer, penance and preparatory sacrifices and good works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass. Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas. The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lords first coming into the world and the anticipation of this second coming to judge the living and the dead.

Advent for Teens & Kids


How to Advent for Teens & Kids

Keep Christ in Christmas



Saint of the Week

The Story of Our Lady of Guadalupe Saint of the Day for December 12

The feast in honor of Our Lady of Guadalupe goes back to the 16th century. Chronicles of that period tell us the story.

A poor Indian named Cuauhtlatohuac was baptized and given the name Juan Diego. He was a 57-year-old widower, and lived in a small village near Mexico City. On Saturday morning December 9, 1531, he was on his way to a nearby barrio to attend Mass in honor of Our Lady.

Juan was walking by a hill called Tepeyac when he heard beautiful music like the warbling of birds. A radiant cloud appeared, and within it stood an Indian maiden dressed like an Aztec princess. The lady spoke to him in his own language and sent him to the bishop of Mexico, a Franciscan named Juan de Zumarraga. The bishop was to build a chapel in the place where the lady appeared.

Eventually the bishop told Juan to have the lady give him a sign. About this same time Juan's uncle became seriously ill. This led poor Juan to try to avoid the lady. Nevertheless the lady found Juan, assured him that his uncle would recover, and provided roses for Juan to carry to the bishop in his cape or tilma.

On December 12, when Juan Diego opened his tilma in the bishop's presence, the roses fell to the ground, and the bishop sank to his knees. On the tilma where the roses had been appeared an image of Mary exactly as she had appeared at the hill of Tepeyac.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

Much time has gone by since the coronavirus has manifested itself and affected our lives in manners we never imagined. I wish to assure you of my continued prayers during these challenging times and to thank you for your cooperation and assistance in regard to the protocols in place within our Diocese to ensure safety while attending church.

Many questions arise at the present time as to where we are going and what we should do. I would like to offer you as much assistance in regard to these questions but there is probably more uncertainty now, especially as the cases of the coronavirus continue to increase within our country and area, as we face an influx of winter residents and as the holidays approach. However, we have learned that, from the measures put in place within our Diocese, all of the Dioceses in Florida and throughout the United States, Catholic churches are among the safest places to be due to the caution that has been exercised.

In view of this, the protocols which are currently in place will remain in place with few exceptions. Your parishes will be informing you of possible accommodations for Christmas in regard to the use of parish halls and extra Masses to accommodate what we really cannot estimate to be the attendance for the day. In this regard, I am allowing the celebration of Christmas Vigil Masses to take place as early as 2:00 PM on Christmas Eve for whatever parishes wish to avail of this option. The dispensation from the obligation of Sunday Mass remains in place should anyone feel uncomfortable to attend, especially if there may be a larger attendance.

One protocol that will change is that regarding the use of masks for public celebration. The present protocol highly recommends that they be used. However, in light of what we have learned about the safety of masks, the increasing of cases and to accommodate the needs of those present for Mass, masks will be required for all who enter the Church effective as of now.

I, again, wish to thank you for your cooperation during these challenging months and assure you of my continued prayers.

Let us pray that a vaccine will become available as quickly as possible and that some semblance of normalcy will return.

May Thanksgiving be blessed for you and your families.
