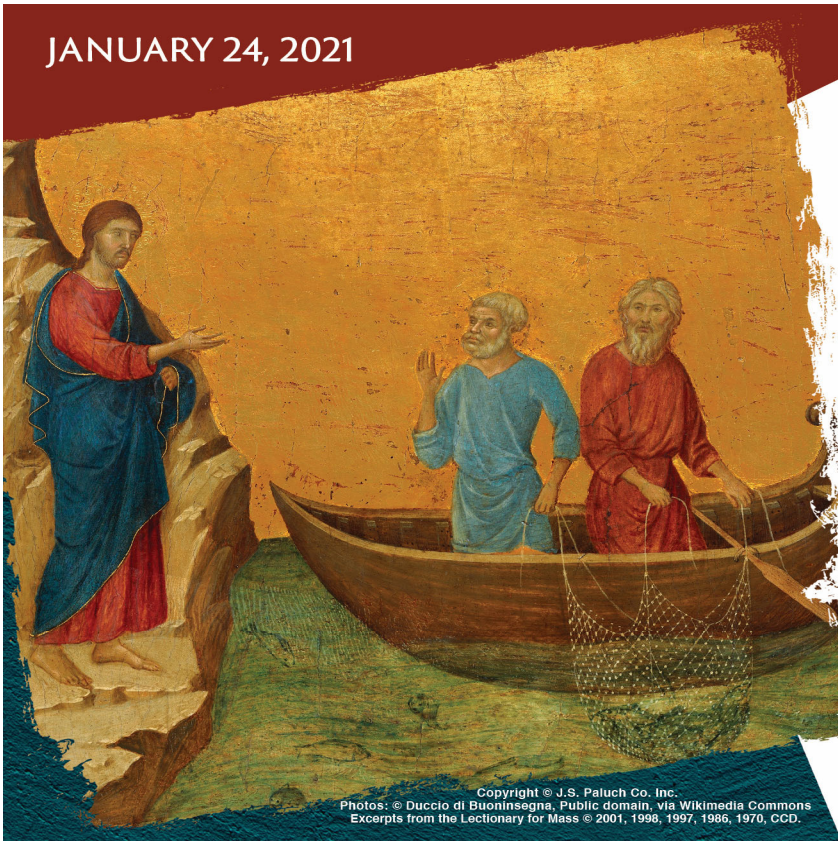

Third Sunday In Ordinary Time (B)
January 24th, 2021
Jon 3:1-5,10 / Ps 25: 4-9 / 1 Cor 7: 29-31 / Mk 1: 14-20

The Gospel describes the beginnings of Jesus' ministry in Galilee. The brief story contains a number of interesting details that give us glimpses into God's work.

John the Baptist is locked up before Jesus begins his ministry. John the Baptist's arrest (and eventual beheading) heralds the start of Jesus' time. The event is described in the passive voice: John the Baptist is not the doer but the receiver of an action. God is the Lord of history, and God works out the divine plans through events pleasant or unpleasant. These are not accidents. Hence, we speak of God's work as a "divine economy." To work with God is to know how to read God's signs in the times.

Jesus begins not in Jerusalem but in Galilee. It is in Jerusalem where the sanctuary, the priest, and the offerings are found. It is the place for worship and for religion: the Temple stands there. Galilee, on the other hand, is a more remote place, known to many as the "Galilee of the Gentiles." By commencing his ministry in Galilee, Jesus, the ambassador of the Father, is showing us: God's work is not confined to rites and rituals. God is God not only of the sanctuary and the sacristy. The whole universe is God's; God's work can begin and manifest anywhere.

Jesus starts his work by the Sea of Galilee, not in a synagogue. The sea is rough, unpredictable, spontaneous, vast, and mysterious. On the other hand, the synagogue is a product of human convention that rigidly separates the "pure" from the "impure," categories created by human beings themselves. To work with God is to remember what John writes: "God is greater than our hearts and knows everything" (1 Jn 3:20).

Jesus calls not well-known Pharisees or Sadducees but unnamed fishermen. The Pharisees and the Sadducees draw authority from being acknowledged by name. Rabbi Shemai, Rabbi Hillel, and Rabbi Gamaliel are authority figures. To work with God and for God is to declare that there is only one name to whom every knee should bend in the heavens, on the earth, or under the earth. Jesus is the only name that matters (cf Phil 2:5-11). The credit is his alone.

Jesus begins his ministry by calling the first disciples by twos. Jesus will later teach: "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (Mt 18:20). To work with God, for God, and in God is to uphold the values of community, peace, communion. True evangelization converts people to turn their hearts to God, and to see God in a Church, that is, a community of brothers and sisters.

Jesus offers an invitation. He calls fishermen who leave their nets and their associates. Aside from life and love, freedom is God's gift and plan for humanity. Salvation is freedom from sin and evil. God respects every person's ability to make choices from the heart. Authentic work for God always respects persons and their inviolable freedom to choose from the heart.

Saint Thomas Aquinas' Story Saint of the Day for January 28

By universal consent, Thomas Aquinas is the preeminent spokesman of the Catholic tradition of reason and of divine revelation. He is one of the great teachers of the medieval Catholic Church, honored with the titles Doctor of the Church and Angelic Doctor.

At five he was given to the Benedictine monastery at Monte Cassino in his parents' hopes that he would choose that way of life and eventually became abbot. In 1239, he was sent to Naples to complete his studies. It was here that he was first attracted to Aristotle's philosophy.

By 1243, Thomas abandoned his family's plans for him and joined the Dominicans, much to his mother's dismay. On her order, Thomas was captured by his brother and kept at home for over a year.

Once free, he went to Paris and then to Cologne, where he finished his studies with Albert the Great. He held two professorships at Paris, lived at the court of Pope Urban IV, directed the Dominican schools at Rome and Viterbo, combated adversaries of the mendicants, as well as the Averroists, and argued with some Franciscans about Aristotelianism.

His greatest contribution to the Catholic Church is his writings. The unity, harmony, and continuity of faith and reason, of revealed and natural human knowledge, pervades his writings. One might expect Thomas, as a man of the gospel, to be an ardent defender of revealed truth. But he was broad enough, deep enough, to see the whole natural order as coming from God the Creator, and to see reason as a divine gift to be highly cherished.

The *Summa Theologiae*, his last and, unfortunately, uncompleted work, deals with the whole of Catholic theology. He stopped work on it after celebrating Mass on December 6, 1273. When asked why he stopped writing, he replied, "I cannot go on.... All that I have written seems to me like so much straw compared to what I have seen and what has been revealed to me." He died March 7, 1274.

Reflection

We can look to Thomas Aquinas as a towering example of Catholicism in the sense of broadness, universality, and inclusiveness. We should be determined anew to exercise the divine gift of reason in us, our power to know, learn, and understand. At the same time we should thank God for the gift of his revelation, especially in Jesus Christ.
