

### Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord April 4th, 2021 Acts 10: 34a / Ps 118: 1-3, 16-17 / 22-23 / Col 3:1-4 / Jn 20: 1-9

At Easter we see lilies, Easter baskets, colored eggs, Easter bunnies, new outfits, etc., but the main symbol is the empty tomb, now in the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem. We've all seen artistic interpretations of the resurrection, but no one but the Roman guards were there when it happened, and they reported it only to the high priests. The only evidence we have of the resurrection is an empty tomb and many eyewitness accounts of people who saw him after his resurrection, people who were willing to go to their death to witness that he was alive, and they indeed did see him.

Like the other Gospel writers, John shows how people reacted in different ways to the resurrection of Jesus. When Peter entered the tomb, he saw the linen cloths that had covered Jesus' body and his head. But he had no reaction; he simply left the tomb and went home. However, when. John saw the empty tomb and the cloths; his response was much different: "He saw and believed."

Mary Magdalene had a different response. When she saw the empty tomb, rather than believing, like John, her reaction was very emotional: she became very sad. Even when she saw and talked with two angels, she was sad. In fact, she was so overcome by sadness that when Jesus himself appeared to her and first talked to her, she did not recognize him. She thought he was the gardener. She only recognized that it was Jesus when he called her name: "Mary!" Then she finally believed.

So, Mary came to faith through the words that Jesus spoke to her. Then, when she recognized Jesus, she clung to him. But he told her, "Do not cling to me." From now on, Mary and the disciples will have a new kind of relationship with Jesus. Now begins his glorified ministry, when he will relate to his followers through the Holy Spirit.

Those who saw him knew that what they were seeing was entirely different than anything they had ever seen before. Jesus was not just a dead man who had come back again to live the life he had before. He came back to a new kind of life, one that is beyond our ability to relate to, so it is shrouded in mystery for us, and yet it is very real. He could be seen and touched, he could eat food with his friends, he could move from one place to another effortlessly, walls and locked doors could not keep him in or out and those who saw him reported he even looked different. Yet when they saw him, they knew it was no one else but the Lord.

Each of us also comes to faith in a different way. Perhaps some of us are impressed by the words of the Bible. Some come closer to God by seeing the example of good Christians. Others may simply feel in their heart that God is good and loving. However, the way we are called is not all that important. The most important thing is how we are responding now to our call. Are we trying our very best now to grow closer to God? Do we show this by the way we pray? Do we share what we have with others? Are we trying to become more loving?

Jesus was on fire with love for God. May we be as zealous as he was about the things of God.

## **Easter Message**

On Christmas day, we rejoice at the conception and birth of Jesus from spirit to flesh. The empty womb of the Blessed Mother became a source of expectation and promise for us of the salvation of the Father.

Now, on this Easter day, we are joyful. From the blessed womb of Mary to the empty tomb of Jesus we have come to celebrate life. Jesus is alive. Christ has risen from the dead. The love between God and man did not end in the tragedy of the cross. Darkness and death were overcome. On Easter morning, the sun shone brightly, triumphantly. Christ conquered sin and death, the twin enemies of the human race, when he rose glorious and immortal from the grave. The love of God is for eternity.

In the resurrection of Christ, St. Paul confidently wrote: "Death has been swallowed up by victory. Death, where is your victory? Death, where is your sting?" (1 Core 1 5: 5 4a-5 5).

Chuck Swindell in "Stress Fractures" states: "We can rebound against wind and weather, calamity and tragedy, disease and death, as long as we have our hope.

We can live weeks without food, days without water, and even several minutes without air, but take away our hope and within only a few seconds, we toss in the towel!"

Christ's resurrection gives us the needed hope to courageously face life in spite of everything. The Good News is that nothing "will separate us from the love of God, which we have in Jesus Christ, our Lord" (Rom. 8:39). Nothing can vanquish us; not suffering or trials, not sorrow or tragedies, not failure or even death. We know instead that life is slowly unfolding with meaning and direction. Sufferings and death, we must experience, but Christ's resurrection teaches us that it will not be in vain. We too will someday share his glorious life.

On this Easter day, our hearts speak with gratitude to the Father for the love he has given to us. We know that our trust in him is not only in this world, but in the eternal life that his son has prepared for us. There is no room for discouragement and emptiness St. Paul declares, "We boast of our hope for the glory of God. But not only that we even boast of our afflictions! We know that affliction makes for endurance, and endurance for tested virtue, and tested virtue for hope. And this hope will not leave us disappointed ..." (Rom. 5:2-5).

Let us live that hope. Let us carry in our lives the Easter meaning. The obedience of Christ to his Father's will brought him to the glorious act of the resurrection. May we struggle to get rid of sin and evil in our lives. Christ has given us that power in his resurrection. We, too, can rise to a new life with him.

On this Easter Day, I would like to express my deepest gratitude to all of you my beloved parishioners for all your support to our parish family. Your love to God and His church makes us an Easter people full of Faith, Hope and Love as we make the Holy Eucharist the center of our lives.

## **Prayer Before Communion**



# THE HISTORICAL AND TRANSCENDENT EVENT

639 The mystery of Christ's resurrection is a real event, with manifestations that were historically verified, as the New Testament bears witness. In about A.D. 56 St. Paul could already write to the Corinthians: "I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received, that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the Twelve. . ."<sup>491</sup> The Apostle speaks here of the living tradition of the Resurrection which he had learned after his conversion at the gates of Damascus. <sup>492</sup>

#### The empty tomb

**640** "Why do you seek the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen." The first element we encounter in the framework of the Easter events is the empty tomb. In itself it is not a direct proof of Resurrection; the absence of Christ's body from the tomb could be explained otherwise. 

\*\*P4Nonetheless the empty tomb was still an essential sign for all. Its discovery by the disciples was the first step toward recognizing the very fact of the Resurrection. This was the case, first with the holy women, and then with Peter. 

\*\*P5 The disciple "whom Jesus loved" affirmed that when he entered the empty tomb and discovered "the linen cloths lying there", "he saw and believed". 

\*\*This suggests that he realized from the empty tomb's condition that the absence of Jesus' body could not have been of human doing and that Jesus had not simply returned to earthly life as had been the case with Lazarus. 

\*\*P6 This suggests that he realized from the empty tomb's condition that the absence of Jesus' body could not have been of human doing and that Jesus had not simply returned to earthly life as had been the case with Lazarus.

### The appearances of the Risen One

- 641 Mary Magdalene and the holy women who came to finish anointing the body of Jesus, which had been buried in haste because the Sabbath began on the evening of Good Friday, were the first to encounter the Risen One. <sup>498</sup> Thus the women were the first messengers of Christ's Resurrection for the apostles themselves. <sup>499</sup> They were the next to whom Jesus appears: first Peter, then the Twelve. Peter had been called to strengthen the faith of his brothers, <sup>500</sup> and so sees the Risen One before them; it is on the basis of his testimony that the community exclaims: "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" <sup>501</sup>
- 642 Everything that happened during those Paschal days involves each of the apostles and Peter in particular in the building of the new era begun on Easter morning. As witnesses of the Risen One, they remain the foundation stones of his Church. The faith of the first community of believers is based on the witness of concrete men known to the Christians and for the most part still living among them. Peter and the Twelve are the primary "witnesses to his Resurrection", but they are not the only ones Paul speaks clearly of more than five hundred persons to whom Jesus appeared on a single occasion and also of James and of all the apostles. 502
- 643 Given all these testimonies, Christ's Resurrection cannot be interpreted as something outside the physical order, and it is impossible not to acknowledge it as an historical fact. It is clear from the facts that the disciples' faith was drastically put to the test by their master's Passion and death on the cross, which he had foretold. The shock provoked by the Passion was so great that at least some of the disciples did not at once believe in the news of the Resurrection. Far from showing us a community seized by a mystical exaltation, the Gospels present us with disciples demoralized ("looking sad" and frightened. For they had not believed the holy women returning from the tomb and had regarded their words as an "idle tale". The Jesus reveals himself to the Eleven on Easter evening, "he upbraided them for their unbelief and hardness of heart, because they had not believed those who saw him after he had risen."
- 644 Even when faced with the reality of the risen Jesus the disciples are still doubtful, so impossible did the thing seem: they thought they were seeing a ghost. "In their joy they were still disbelieving and still wondering." Thomas will also experience the test of doubt and St. Matthew relates that during the risen Lord's last appearance in Galilee "some doubted." Therefore the hypothesis that the Resurrection was produced by the apostles' faith (or credulity) will not hold up. On the contrary their faith in the Resurrection was born, under the action of divine grace, from their direct experience of the reality of the risen Jesus.

## Saint of the Week

# Saint Mary Magdalene's Story

Except for the mother of Jesus, few women are more honored in the Bible than Mary Magdalene. Yet she could well be the patron of the slandered, since there has been a persistent legend in the Church that she is the unnamed sinful woman who anointed the feet of Jesus in Luke 7:36-50.

Most Scripture scholars today point out that there is no scriptural basis for confusing the two women. Mary Magdalene, that is, "of Magdala," was the one from whom Christ cast out "seven demons" (Luke 8:2)—an indication at the worst, of extreme demonic possession or possibly, severe illness.

Writing in the *New Catholic Commentary*, Father Wilfrid J. Harrington, O.P., says that "seven demons" "does not mean that Mary had lived an immoral life—a conclusion reached only by means of a mistaken identification with the anonymous woman of Luke 7:36." In the *Jerome Biblical Commentary*, Father Edward Mally, S.J., agrees that she "is not...the same as the sinner of Luke 7:37, despite the later Western romantic tradition about her."


Mary Magdalene was one of the many "who were assisting them [Jesus and the Twelve] out of their means." She was one of those who stood by the cross of Jesus with his mother. And, of all the "official" witnesses who might have been chosen for the first awareness of the Resurrection, she was the one to whom that privilege was given. She is known as the "Apostle to the Apostles."

### Reflection

Mary Magdalene has been a victim of mistaken identity for almost 20 centuries. Yet she would no doubt insist that it makes no difference. We are all sinners in need of the saving power of God, whether our sins have been lurid or not. More importantly, we are all "unofficial" witnesses of the Resurrection.




