Sixth Sunday of Easter (B)

May 9th, 2021

Acts 10: 25-26, 34-35, 44-48 / Ps 98: 1-4 / 1 Jn 4: 7-10 / Jn 15: 9-17

There was a girl who was born without an ear. She became a shy and introverted person. There are times when she would go home crying because her classmates made fun of her. When she became a teenager, her mother brought her to a surgeon who performed an ear transplant on her. The operation was successful and she became a normal and happy person.

Not long after she had a boyfriend. After several years, she decided to get married. On the eve of her wedding day, she went inside her mother's room to thank her. But as she embraced her she noticed something strange... something absent. She realized that beneath the long hair from her mother was missing an ear.

She cried and said in "It was you! All these years you didn't tell me it was you." The mother replied, "My child, I didn't tell you because I didn't want you to be sad for me. I did it because I want you to be happy, to see you happy with your life. You don't lose something when you give it to someone you love."

While the world teaches us to use and exploit people to our own advantage, Jesus enjoins us to live in his love by loving one another as he has loved us. We can be known as his true disciples by our love for one another. What right does Jesus have to tell us to love one another? Love is not something begged nor dictated. It is something earned and freely given. We only have to look at the crucifix with Jesus hanging in agony and death to remind us that he freely gave his life to prove his love for us. Our Lord gave us the example that love is stronger than sin. He did not condemn Magdalene; he effected in the conversion of tax collectors like Matthew and Zacchaeus. He was not afraid to touch and heal the sick; he stretched out his hand to the lepers; he whispered forgiveness to the good thief. Love can renew life. Love can cleanse sin. Love can conquer death.

This is the reason why we have to love one another not in the measure of our human ability to love nor on account of how others can return our love, but as God has loved us. For Jesus said, "Love one another as I have loved you."

Your husband may not be a perfect husband yet you have to love him not because he has met your expectations, but as Jesus loved us. Your wife may have her weaknesses and shortcomings, but as Jesus has loved us, you must love her. You may have frustrations with your children, but you continue to love them because of the love of Jesus. This principle is applied to all the people around us, whether they are our friends or our enemies.

In short, the measure of love is Jesus. This simply means love has transcended all the human standards. Love can find its real meaning and perfection in the divine love that Jesus unconditionally manifested to us.

St. John wrote, "This is love: not that we loved God but that he first loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins....No one has ever seen God, but if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love spreads freely among us...if anyone says, 'I love God,' while he hates his brother, he is a liar. How can he love God whom he does not see, if he does not love his brother whom he sees? We received from him this commandment: let him who loves God also love his brother" (1 Jn. 4:10, 12, 20).

In the offertory part of the Mass, we notice the wine poured in to the chalice, and then a little water is added. The wine is strong and powerful. It represents the love of Christ. The water is weak and powerless. This represents our love. But when the water is mixed with the wine, it becomes one with the water and its invigorated and strengthened. It is consecrated and raised up as a chalice of salvation.

Let our love be mingled with Christ's love. May it be a chalice of renewal, a spirit of healing and forgiveness, a sign of hope and discipleship. May God inspire us to pour it out until the end.

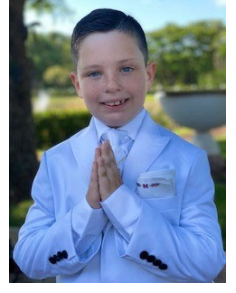

Saint Damien de Veuster of Moloka'i

When Joseph de Veuster was born in Tremelo, Belgium, in 1840, few people in Europe had any firsthand knowledge of leprosy, Hansen's disease. By the time he died at the age of 49, people all over the world knew about this disease because of him. They knew that human compassion could soften the ravages of this disease.

Forced to quit school at age 13 to work on the family farm, Joseph entered the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary six years later, taking the name of a fourth-century physician and martyr. When his brother Pamphile, a priest in the same congregation, fell ill and was unable to go to the Hawaiian Islands as assigned, Damien quickly volunteered in his place. In May 1864, two months after arriving in his new mission, Damien was ordained a priest in Honolulu and assigned to the island of Hawaii.

In 1873, he went to the Hawaiian government's leper colony on the island of Moloka'i, set up seven years earlier. Part of a team of four chaplains taking that assignment for three months each year, Damien soon volunteered to remain permanently, caring for the people's physical, medical, and spiritual needs. In time, he became their most effective advocate to obtain promised government support.

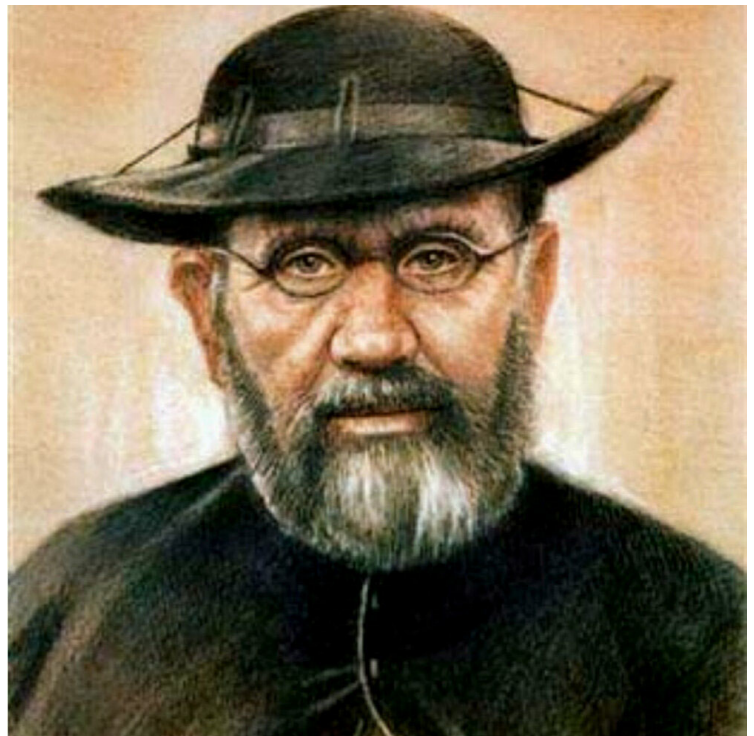
Soon the settlement had new houses and a new church, school and orphanage. Morale improved considerably. A few years later, he succeeded in getting the Franciscan Sisters of Syracuse, led by Mother Marianne Cope, to help staff this colony in Kalaupapa.

Damien contracted Hansen's disease and died of its complications. As requested, he was buried in Kalaupapa, but in 1936 the Belgian government succeeded in having his body moved to Belgium. Part of Damien's body was returned to his beloved Hawaiian brothers and sisters after his beatification in 1995.

When Hawaii became a state in 1959, it selected Damien as one of its two representatives in the Statuary Hall at the US Capitol. Damien was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on October 11, 2009.

Reflection

Some people thought Damien was a hero for going to Moloka'i and others thought he was crazy. When a Protestant clergyman wrote that Damien was guilty of immoral behavior, Robert Louis Stevenson vigorously defended him in an "Open Letter to Dr. Hyde."
