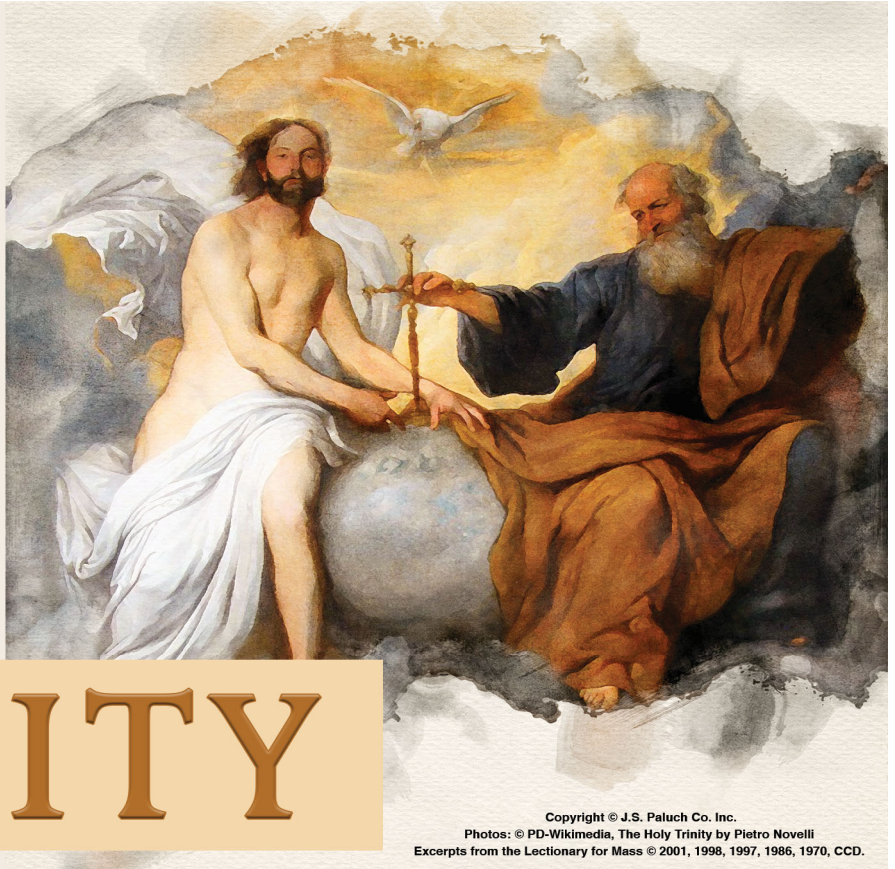

The Most Holy Trinity

May 30rd, 2021

Dt 4:32-34, 39-40 / Ps 33: 4-6, 9, 18-20, 22 / Rom 8: 14-17 / Mt 28: 16-20

We contend that the Church is one, holy, catholic and apostolic, but we also add that she is indestructible. She cannot be destroyed by the power for her enemies nor by the weakness of men because she is founded by the power of God. Christ told Peter: "On this rock I will build my Church; and never will the powers of death overcome it" (Mt. 16:18). When he commissioned his disciples to evangelize, he assured them: "I am with you always until the end of this world" (Mt. 28:20).

We have a subject in College that deals with the philosophy of knowledge, epistemology. It begs the question, "How can you know that you know that you really know?" Knowledge and truth can be construed subjectively depending upon one's appreciation of things.

The question I would like to ask therefore is: how can we know that we really know that the truths about our faith are really true? Of course, we based the truths on the light of the revelation of the Sacred Scriptures and Tradition as interpreted by the Church Magisterium. But how can the truths be accepted as true especially if we do not know understand it fully well? I believe that ultimately it is God speaking into our hearts to convince us that these truths we hold and hear are really true. This is a gift of certainty given to us by God through the guidance of the Church's teaching.

One of the truths that we cannot fully understand is the mystery of the Blessed Trinity. When we talk about mystery, it doesn't mean we know nothing about it nor we don't have any basis about it. Our limited human mind cannot simply discern everything about the truth of God. God is not completely beyond comprehension, neither is he within complete comprehension. Be that as it may, the Blessed Trinity establishes the basis of personalizing the manner of calling our God.

Christ does not want us to experience this apprehension. He revealed to us who God is. In the Gospel of St. John, Jesus said, "I have made your name known to those you gave me from the world... For this is eternal life: to know you, the only true God, and the One you sent, Jesus Christ" (17: 6,3). Thus when Christ taught his disciples to pray, he told them to call God our Father in heaven, the one who created everything the Creator; he calls God, Jesus Christ the Son, who redeemed us from our sins, the Savior; he calls God the Holy Spirit the Paraclete to be our guide and advocate, the Sanctifier.

This is the reason why when we pray and start our church's celebration, we begin by naming persons: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Three names, three persons, one God. And we are baptized in the name of these three names, in the name of one God.

Our Lord did not only give us God's names. He also revealed our relationship with God and with one another. God's disclosure of himself as three persons tells us that we cannot live in autonomous individualism. We can only find fulfillment through our unselfish concern and love for those around us. We are called upon to form a community of disciples in the spirit of the Blessed Trinity who are united as a community of persons. To accede to exclusiveness and selfishness with our family, church and our community, would only mean we are not living the Trinitarian mystery.

The children's Mass will start promptly at 10am so it does not effect the starting time of the 10:30am Mass in Columbus Hall.

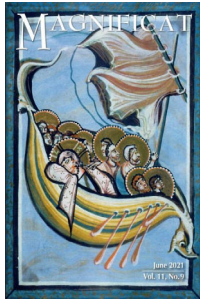

Saint Boniface's Story

Boniface, known as the apostle of the Germans, was an English Benedictine monk who gave up being elected abbot to devote his life to the conversion of the Germanic tribes. Two characteristics stand out: his Christian orthodoxy and his fidelity to the pope of Rome.

How absolutely necessary this orthodoxy and fidelity were is borne out by the conditions Boniface found on his first missionary journey in 719 at the request of Pope Gregory II. Paganism was a way of life. What Christianity he did find had either lapsed into paganism or was mixed with error. The clergy were mainly responsible for these latter conditions since they were in many instances uneducated, lax and questionably obedient to their bishops. In particular instances their very ordinations were questionable.

These are the conditions that Boniface was to report in 722 on his first return visit to Rome. The Holy Father instructed him to reform the German Church. The pope sent letters of recommendation to religious and civil leaders. Boniface later admitted that his work would have been unsuccessful, from a human viewpoint, without a letter of safe-conduct from Charles Martel, the powerful Frankish ruler, grandfather of Charlemagne. Boniface was finally made a regional bishop and authorized to organize the whole German Church. He was eminently successful.

In the Frankish kingdom, he met great problems because of lay interference in bishops' elections, the worldliness of the clergy and lack of papal control.

During a final mission to the Frisians, Boniface and 53 companions were massacred while he was preparing converts for confirmation.

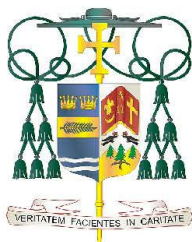
In order to restore the Germanic Church to its fidelity to Rome and to convert the pagans, Boniface had been guided by two principles. The first was to restore the obedience of the clergy to their bishops in union with the pope of Rome. The second was the establishment of many houses of prayer which took the form of Benedictine monasteries. A great number of Anglo-Saxon monks and nuns followed him to the continent, where he introduced the Benedictine nuns to the active apostolate of education.

Reflection

Boniface bears out the Christian rule: To follow Christ is to follow the way of the cross. For Boniface, it was not only physical suffering or death, but the painful, thankless, bewildering task of Church reform. Missionary glory is often thought of in terms of bringing new persons to Christ. It seems—but is not—less glorious to heal the household of the faith.

Next weekend, June 12/13 the Diocese of Palm Beach will have a special collection for two causes: Black & Indian Missions and the Catholic Home Missions.

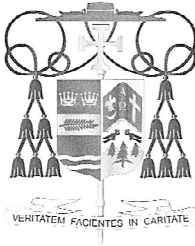

The Catholic Home Missions portion of the collection primarily supports home mission dioceses, that is, those dioceses in the United States that are unable to offer their people the basic pastoral ministries of word, worship, and service without outside help. Dear Brother Priest:

I wanted to make you aware of new information from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops regarding the Hyde Amendment. This important news has been shared with your parish by our Director of Communications, Jennifer Trefelner, plus it has been posted on our Diocese of Palm Beach website and social media platforms.

I write to you today to personally request that you review this information on the Hyde Amendment and to do your best to promote it within your parish, as it is of utmost importance to us all. I want to also thank those of you who have assisted by sharing this information already.

What is the Hyde Amendment?

- The Hyde Amendment, contained in the federal government's annual appropriations legislation, prohibits federal funding of domestic abortions, except in cases of rape, incest or to save the life of the mother. It is a bipartisan provision that has been part of federal appropriations for 45 years (since 1976) and enjoys overwhelming public support, including strong support from low-income women, and women of color.
- The Hyde Amendment has served as the model for dozens of other federal policies that prohibit the government from funding abortion in other areas (for example, in foreign assistance programs, trafficking programs, community health programs, or health insurance). In addition to being widely supported by Americans, Hyde and Hyde-related policies save lives and respect the consciences of Americans. However, these policies are now under grave threat of being repealed.

Because Congress' process of determining the use of funds takes months, we will be needing your help at several points from now through the fall. However, it is critically important for Catholics to send a strong message before Congress moves forward to impose taxpayer-funded abortion.

The USCCB is targeting the first week of June for widespread action regarding the Hyde Amendment. The primary goal is for *millions of Catholics to sign the petition* at NoTaxpayerAbortion.com. They need your help making that happen.
