

Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)

July 4th, 2021

Ez 2: 2-5 / Ps 123: 1-4 / 2 Cor 12: 7-10 / Mk 6: 1-6a

The Gospel today tells us something very important.

When Jesus preaches in the synagogue of his hometown, at first, the people are very impressed. However, as we can see, this feeling soon turns to jealousy. They say to one another, "Where did he get all this? What kind of wisdom is he endowed with? How is it that such miraculous deeds are accomplished by his hands?" Mark then writes that Jesus was not able to perform any miracles there. Why? Because the people lacked faith. Instead of accepting Jesus as the Messiah, they question his authority and reject him.

One of the problems here is the fact that Jesus' townspeople suffer from over-familiarity. They have grown so accustomed to him, once he begins to show his wisdom and power, they refused to accept him.

We wonder, is this not a danger we all face as Christians? Many of us have been brought up since childhood as members of the Church. We did not have to struggle with our faith. From the time we were young, most of the people we associated with were Christians. And so, it was easy to believe. We had easy access to the sacraments; priests and nuns surrounded us; and the church building was never far away. However, little by little, some fell away, perhaps for these very reasons: it was all so easy that they took it for granted. Perhaps it could be said that many lost the ability to appreciate the presence of God in their life.

It is a blessing that God has not lost patience with us or given up on all of us. He continues to try to send us people to teach us how to live good and holy lives in spite of our rebellious natures. It is a great honor for God to call someone his prophet, but it is also a difficult and often thankless task. You who are parents know what it is like. The job of a parent is not as prominent as that of an Ezekiel or Jeremiah or Jesus, but to a lesser degree a parent's role is the same as a prophet, trying to teach their children to be good and sometimes having to face a fair amount of resistance.

It is not just parents, however, who have the prophetic role of helping others to know God and to know God's ways. In the sacrament of Confirmation, we are all anointed to be witnesses of Christ and of our faith whenever the opportunity arises. Sometimes we can witness through words of encouragement, as long as we do not get too preachy. Sometimes we can witness by sharing with another person how much help our faith gives us. Sometimes we can only witness by our life, by a good life and by prayer.

There is one other aspect of our gospel we must not miss. God usually communicates with us in very simple ways. The people of Nazareth thought they could not learn anything from a carpenter. In our pride, our envy, our prejudices, our willingness to follow the crowd, we can easily miss the ways God is trying to break through our defenses. This morning/ afternoon he comes to us in a most simple way, as food and drink. Yet for those who have eyes to see, in this holy meal it is infinite life and love that is given to us.

Saint Maria Goretti's Story

One of the largest crowds ever assembled for a canonization—250,000—symbolized the reaction of millions touched by the simple story of Maria Goretti. She was the daughter of a poor Italian tenant farmer, had no chance to go to school, never learned to read or write. When Maria made her First Communion not long before her death, she was one of the larger and somewhat backward members of the class.

On a hot afternoon in July, Maria was sitting at the top of the stairs of her house, mending a shirt. She was not quite 12 years old, but physically mature. A cart stopped outside, and a neighbor, 18-year-old Alessandro, ran up the stairs. He seized her and pulled her into a bedroom. She struggled and tried to call for help. “No, God does not wish it,” she cried out. “It is a sin. You would go to hell for it.” Alessandro began striking at her blindly with a long dagger.

Maria was taken to a hospital. Her last hours were marked by the usual simple compassion of the good—concern about where her mother would sleep, forgiveness of her murderer (she had been in fear of him, but did not say anything lest she cause trouble to his family), and her devout welcoming of Viaticum, her last Holy Communion. She died about 24 hours after the attack.

Alessandro was sentenced to 30 years in prison. For a long time he was unrepentant and surly. One night he had a dream or vision of Maria gathering flowers and offering them to him. His life changed. When he was released after 27 years, his first act was to beg the forgiveness of Maria’s mother.

Devotion to the young martyr grew, miracles were worked, and in less than half a century she was canonized. At her beatification in 1947, her 82-year-old mother, two sisters, and her brother appeared with Pope Pius XII on the balcony of St. Peter’s. Three years later, at Maria’s canonization, a 66-year-old Alessandro Serenelli knelt among the quarter-million people and cried tears of joy.

Reflection

Maria may have had trouble with catechism, but she had no trouble with faith. God’s will was holiness, decency, respect for one’s body, absolute obedience, total trust. In a complex world, her faith was simple: It is a privilege to be loved by God, and to love him—at any cost.
