Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)
July 11th, 2021

The Gospel gives us Jesus' traveling instructions to the Twelve. In Palestine of Jesus' time, the natives had five articles of clothing: a long inner tunic, an outer cloak, a cincture or belt, an oriental headdress, and sandals. Travelers carry a bag for food. So, the apostles were sent out as poor, simple, generous men.

I do not think the Lord expects everyone to live in such simplicity and poverty, although there have been holy people who managed to do so, such as St. Francis or Mother Theresa. I think our Lord is telling us we do not have to have a lot of things to survive or even to be comfortable and happy. In other words, "travel light" is one of the messages from today's gospel.

Sometimes we forget that as we go through life, we are just tourists visiting this planet; we are on a long trip, but we are not staying here forever. As St. Paul tells us, our destination, our real home is heaven. We are not going to take anything with us there, except our good deeds. How about all the stuff we are dragging with us through life; is it helping us move forward to our final goal or is it slowing us down, or even worse, is it a distraction that makes us forget where we are going? Sometimes it is the quest for material things that loads us down on this journey, but it can be other things too. Sports can hold such a priority in people's lives that they never have the time to pray or get to church on Sunday or to spend quality time with their family. An excessive love for entertainment or always being too busy can do the same thing. Maybe it is a lot of anger and resentment that we keep holding on to, or addictions and bad habits. St. Paul tells us that God chose us before the world began to be holy and blameless in his sight. If we were created to be holy, what is getting in our way? The stuff that slows us down in our journey to God can also keep us from finding true joy as we go through life. It will limit our experience of the Lord who is our ultimate peace and joy. May I end with a simple example? If we try to swim with too much weighing us down, we do not do well. We may be so weighted down that we just sink. It is possible for a person to let so many things get in the way for their relationship with God that they sink spiritually too.

From The Pastor's Desk

Beloved Parishioners,

There have been many questions regarding our upcoming maintenance and Pavilion projects here at Emmanuel. The Diocese comes down each year to inspect the church property and makes recommendations to us on what they feel needs to be done. The recommendations this year included: Repair and/ or replace our Rosary Path and all landscaping, etc. in that area; Repair and/or replace the outside Crucifix and Corpus; and the Grotto area.

Thankfully, these projects totaling approximately \$47,000.00 will be paid for out of our existing Maintenance/ Operating Account. We have broken down these costs in our bulletin just to keep you informed as we move along with each project.

Our Pavilion Project which includes a covered shrine to the Holy Infant Jesus is what the Capital Campaign for \$1.3 million is being raised. Included in this project will be further recommendations from the Diocese:

Replace- Landscaping and sod for the entire campus

Replace- Parking lot and stripping of curbing and replace the roofing on the Priests residence

While these are separate projects all donations will be gratefully accepted. Your continued generosity has made all these projects possible.

We have broken down the costs of each recommendation received from the Diocese in order that you have informed as we move along with the work.

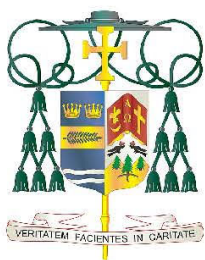

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In sacramental marriage we are called to live with Christ-like love; an authentic love that is free, total, faithful and fruitful. In support of this call to married fruitfulness, the Church proposes Natural Family Planning (NFP) as a modern, scientific method available to couples for planning their families by enabling them to participate in God's creative action without breaking the inseparable link between the unitive and procreative meanings of the conjugal (marital) act. As NFP becomes a way of life, the couple cooperates with each other and God in responsibly planning their family without the devastating spiritual and physical harm caused by artificial contraceptive methods.

Natural Family Planning Awareness week, the annual national educational campaign sponsored by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) is a wonderful opportunity for us to share the good news about God's perfect design for marriage and responsible parenting. This year, Natural Family Planning (NFP) Awareness week will be celebrated from July 25 through July 31 with the theme: *To Have, To Hold, To Honor* in support of God's gifts of love and life in marriage.

This week also celebrates the 53rd anniversary of the papal encyclical *Humanae Vitae* in which Saint Pope Paul VI prophetically articulates the grave consequences of the use of artificial and illicit means of birth control. These consequences include a general lowering of morality, increased infidelity, and devaluing of women (*HV*, no. 17). One only needs to scan today's headlines to confirm the devastating accuracy of his predictions and discern the destructive consequences for families. In contrast, couples who practice NFP enjoy greater marital stability and experience divorce at only one-tenth the rate of divorce among first time marriages.

During NFP Awareness Week, I would like to thank those married couples who live out their marriage commitment to free, total, faithful and fruitful love. I encourage all married couples and those preparing for marriage to reflect on their current or future marriages and how they can authentically and responsibly fulfill their commitment to fruitful love. Saint of the Week

Saint Kateri Tekakwitha's Story

The blood of martyrs is the seed of saints. Nine years after the Jesuits Isaac Jogues and Jean de Lelande were tomahawked by Iroquois warriors, a baby girl was born near the place of their martyrdom, Auriesville, New York.

Her mother was a Christian Algonquin, taken captive by the Iroquois and given as wife to the chief of the Mohawk clan, the boldest and fiercest of the Five Nations. When she was four, Tekakwitha lost her parents and little brother in a smallpox epidemic that left her disfigured and half blind. She was adopted by an uncle, who succeeded her father as chief. He hated the coming of the Blackrobes—Jesuit missionaries—but could do nothing to them because a peace treaty with the French required their presence in villages with Christian captives. She was moved by the words of three Blackrobes who lodged with her uncle, but fear of him kept her from seeking instruction. Tekakwitha refused to marry a Mohawk brave, and at 19 finally got the courage to take the step of converting. She was baptized with the name Kateri-Catherine on Easter Sunday.

Now she would be treated as a slave. Because she would not work on Sunday, Kateri received no food that day. Her life in grace grew rapidly. She told a missionary that she often meditated on the great dignity of being baptized. She was powerfully moved by God's love for human beings and saw the dignity of each of her people.

She was always in danger, for her conversion and holy life created great opposition. On the advice of a priest, Kateri stole away one night and began a 200-mile walking journey to a Christian Indian village at Sault St. Louis, near Montreal.

For three years she grew in holiness under the direction of a priest and an older Iroquois woman, giving herself totally to God in long hours of prayer, in charity, and in strenuous penance. At 23, Kateri took a vow of virginity, an unprecedented act for an Indian woman whose future depended on being married. She found a place in the woods where she could pray an hour a day—and was accused of meeting a man there!

Her dedication to virginity was instinctive: Kateri did not know about religious life for women until she visited Montreal. Inspired by this, she and two friends wanted to start a community, but the local priest dissuaded her. She humbly accepted an "ordinary" life. She practiced extremely severe fasting as penance for the conversion of her nation. Kateri Tekakwitha died the afternoon before Holy Thursday. Witnesses said that her emaciated face changed color and became like that of a healthy child. The lines of suffering, even the pockmarks, disappeared and the touch of a smile came upon her lips. She was beatified in 1980 and canonized in 2012.

Reflection

We like to think that our proposed holiness is thwarted by our situation. If only we could have more solitude, less opposition, better health. Kateri Tekakwitha repeats the example of the saints: Holiness thrives on the cross, anywhere. Yet she did have what Christians—all people—need: the support of a community. She had a good mother, helpful priests, Christian friends. These were present in what we call primitive conditions, and blossomed in the age-old Christian triad of prayer, fasting and almsgiving: union with God in Jesus and the Spirit, self-discipline and often suffering, and charity for her brothers and sisters.
