Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)
August 8th, 2021
1 Kgs 19: 4-8 / Ps 34 2-9 / Eph 4:30-5:2 / Jn 6:41-51

There is a splendid phrase in Luke's Gospel about Mary. He writes about her reaction after she witnessed the adoration of the angels and the arrival of the Magi: "She treasured all these things and pondered them in her heart" (2:19). This tells us most clearly that Mary was an alert observer. Not only that, she also thought deeply about what she saw.

Today's Gospel refers to something very similar. Why did the Jews depicted in today's Gospel story not accept Jesus? Obviously, they lacked faith. Perhaps we can say that they were not perspicacious: they didn't look closely enough at Jesus and the kind of person he was. Instead, they judged him according to his outward behavior and physical lineage: he was merely the son of Joseph and Mary. We might say, in other words, that their worldly way of thinking blocked their spiritual vision, the result of which was their denial of Jesus.

In the next section of the Gospel, Jesus says, "No one can come to me unless he is drawn by the Father who sent me, and I will raise him up on the last day" (6:44). Once again, we hear about the importance of listening. By listening attentively, one learns. By listening, one opens one's self to the enriching grace of God.

And how, we may ask, does God speak to us? He speaks to us in many different ways. When we pray, we open our heart to God, making ourselves ready to receive inspiration and enlightenment. If we are alert and perspective, we can see God speaking to us in each and every happening in our daily life. And, of course, we are able to recognize Jesus' presence among us every time we receive his body and blood in the Eucharist.

God continuously teaches us. Let us try our best to open our heart so that when God does speak to us, we will be ready to listen and do what He tells us.

We have to take it on faith, too, that there is a lot in Jesus' teaching and his sacraments that we cannot see and will never see in this world with our eyes. We can only believe what our ears tell us. When we look at the host we see what looks like bread. What we hear, though, are the words of Jesus, "The bread that I will give is my flesh." Jesus is the bread of life. Believing in him, living according to his word and receiving his sacraments are life-giving. He gives us life that is abundant, a life that is eternal, a life that will bring greater joy that we can now imagine. We thank the Lord for his gift of divine nourishment he gives us today.

A NOTE TO EXTRAORDINARY EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS:

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion who serve the Holy Communion during Masses are to sanitize their hands after receiving Holy Communion from the Celebrant. Sanitizers are placed at the credence table. Eucharistic Ministers are to wear masks while distributing Holy Communion. Thank you so much for being a Eucharistic Minister at our Parish.



Saint Lawrence's Story

The esteem in which the Church holds Lawrence is seen in the fact that today's celebration ranks as a feast. We know very little about his life. He is one of those whose martyrdom made a deep and lasting impression on the early Church. Celebration of his feast day spread rapidly.

He was a Roman deacon under Pope Saint Sixtus II. Four days after this pope was put to death, Lawrence and four clerics suffered martyrdom, probably during the persecution of the Emperor Valerian.

Legendary details of Lawrence's death were known to Damasus, Prudentius, Ambrose, and Augustine. The church built over his tomb became one of the seven principal churches in Rome and a favorite place for Roman pilgrimages.

A well-known legend has persisted from earliest times. As deacon in Rome, Lawrence was charged with the responsibility for the material goods of the Church, and the distribution of alms to the poor. When Lawrence knew he would be arrested like the pope, he sought out the poor, widows, and orphans of Rome and gave them all the money he had on hand, selling even the sacred vessels of the altar to increase the sum. When the prefect of Rome heard of this, he imagined that the Christians must have considerable treasure. He sent for Lawrence and said, "You Christians say we are cruel to you, but that is not what I have in mind. I am told that your priests offer in gold, that the sacred blood is received in silver cups, that you have golden candlesticks at your evening services. Now, your doctrine says you must render to Caesar what is his. Bring these treasures—the emperor needs them to maintain his forces. God does not cause money to be counted: He brought none of it into the world with him—only words. Give me the money, therefore, and be rich in words."

Lawrence replied that the Church was indeed rich. "I will show you a valuable part. But give me time to set everything in order and make an inventory." After three days he gathered a great number of blind, lame, maimed, leprous, orphaned, and widowed persons and put them in rows. When the prefect arrived, Lawrence simply said, "These are the treasure of the Church."

The prefect was so angry he told Lawrence that he would indeed have his wish to die—but it would be by inches. He had a great gridiron prepared with coals beneath it, and had Lawrence's body placed on it. After the martyr had suffered the pain for a long time, the legend concludes, he made his famous cheerful remark, "It is well done. Turn me over!"

Reflection

Once again we have a saint about whom almost nothing is known, yet one who has received extraordinary honor in the Church since the fourth century. Almost nothing—yet the greatest fact of his life is certain: He died for Christ. We who are hungry for details about the lives of the saints are again reminded that their holiness was after all, a total response to Christ, expressed perfectly by a death like this.
