

Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time (B) August 22th, 2021 Jos 24: 1-2a, 15-17, 18b / Ps 34: 2-3, 16-21 / Eph 5: 21-32 / Jn 6: 60-69

Today's gospel describes what must have been a very sad day for Jesus. John tells us most of Jesus' followers walked away from him. The day before, they were ready to make him a king; for he had fed them (a great crowd) miraculously with five loaves and two fish. When he told them he was going to give them his flesh to eat and his blood to drink, they thought he was crazy. As Jesus saw them leaving, he asked his apostles if they wanted to leave too. What Jesus had been saying was so serious and so important that he was willing to let <u>everyone</u> walk away from him if they chose.

There was no way to compromise on what he said, no way to water it down. The real bread he came to offer them was himself, he told them, and it was food that would give them eternal life. When they questioned this, he only said it more empathetically and more clearly. Their response was: "This saying is hard; who can accept it?" What was hard was their own minds. They wouldn't open their minds to something they couldn't understand. In all of this we get an ideal picture of what we call "faith". Faith is accepting what we cannot understand, what we cannot prove, what we cannot figure out. We just accept something as true because we trust Jesus who tells us it is so.

Notice, Jesus didn't call the people back who were walking away from him. He didn't say, "Wait people, I'm just talking figuratively. I'm just talking symbolically. I don't mean you really have to eat my flesh and drink my blood! You misunderstand me." He knew there was no misunderstanding; they understood him perfectly and he let them go.

If you want proof from the Bible for the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist, you'll find lots of proof, but I think this is the clearest proof you'll find. We might hear the words of Jesus at the Last Supper: "This is my body" and quibble over the definition of "is", but there can be little doubt that Jesus is telling us in this event that the Eucharist is really his body and blood. Those who cannot understand how it can be try to tell us the Eucharist is <u>only</u> a reminder of

Jesus' death for us, or that it is <u>only</u> a symbol, or somehow Jesus comes to us <u>along with</u> the bread and wine but it's not really changed. They are in effect saying Jesus didn't really mean what he said.


We who believe in the Eucharist as the body and blood of Christ do not understand how it could be any better than

anyone else. And theologians and philosophers have given it their best effort but we still don't know "how" it can be. So it still comes down to faith.

Here we can ask ourselves a question: Why was it that Peter and some of the disciples stayed with Jesus, while others left him? The answer is simple: Peter and his companions stayed because they had more faith in Jesus. Why was this so? They had more faith because they listened closely to what Jesus said and let it sink into their hearts. The same is true when they saw what Jesus did: they observed everything closely and decided that, indeed, he must be the Messiah, the Son of God.

The Gospel points to the importance of faith as well as the need to persevere in the face of difficulties. If we hold on when we encounter a problem or stumbling block, we will overcome. How can we do this? The important thing is to try to see that what happens in our daily life is related very closely to God. And, indeed, what is *not* related to God! This the way we must see life. It is just as Jesus said, "Every hair on your head has been counted" (Lk. 12:7).

May we continuously try to deepen our faith in God. And may we say, like Peter, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

From your Pastor's Desk


Dear parishioners,

The story of Pedro Calungsod shows us that young people can do great things. Born in the Philippines, Pedro was only 13 when he joined a group of Spanish missionaries who were going to travel to the Marianas Islands to teach the native people about God.


Pedro loved the Church, and he received the Sacraments whenever he could. He was eager to share what he knew about Jesus with others. He did well, and many people were baptized into the faith because of his efforts.

But some people did not trust the missionary priests. Often the medicine men in the village viewed the missionaries as a threat to their power. One night, when Pedro and a priest arrived in a village to baptize the chief's daughter—at the request of the chief's wife—they were killed by assassins led by the chief. Pedro died for his faith in 1672, when he was only 17.

In 2000, Pope John Paul II beatified Pedro, telling the crowds that gathered for the ceremony, "From his childhood, Pedro Calungsod declared himself unwaveringly for Christ and responded generously to his call. Young people today can draw encouragement and strength from the example of Pedro, whose love of Jesus inspired him to devote his teenage years to teaching the faith as a lay catechist."

Pedro Calungsod was canonized on October 21, 2012, by Pope Benedict XVI.

Our Parish is blessed to have the statue of San Pedro kept across from Deacon Tony's office. San Pedro Calungsod is the second Filipino canonized saint.

Saint of the Week

Saint Monica's Story

The circumstances of St. Monica's life could have made her a nagging wife, a bitter daughter-in-law, and a despairing parent, yet she did not give way to any of these temptations. Although she was a Christian, her parents gave her in marriage to a pagan, Patricius, who lived in her hometown of Tagaste in North Africa. Patricius had some redeeming features, but he had a violent temper and was licentious. Monica also had to bear with a cantankerous mother-in-law who lived in her home. Patricius criticized his wife because of her charity and piety, but always respected her. Monica's prayers and example finally won her husband and mother-in-law to Christianity. Her husband died in 371, one year after his baptism.

Monica had at least three children who survived infancy. The oldest, Augustine, is the most famous. At the time of his father's death, Augustine was 17 and a rhetoric student in Carthage. Monica was distressed to learn that her son had accepted the Manichean heresy—"all flesh is evil"—and was living an immoral life. For a while, she refused to let him eat or sleep in her house. Then one night she had a vision that assured her Augustine would return to the faith. From that time on, she stayed close to her son, praying and fasting for him. In fact she often stayed much closer than Augustine wanted.

When he was 29, Augustine decided to go to Rome to teach rhetoric. Monica was determined to go along. One night he told his mother that he was going to the dock to say goodbye to a friend. Instead he set sail for Rome. Monica was heartbroken when she learned of Augustine's trick, but she still followed him. She arrived in Rome only to find that he had left for Milan. Although travel was difficult, Monica pursued him to Milan.

In Milan, Augustine came under the influence of the bishop, St. Ambrose, who also became Monica's spiritual director. She accepted his advice in everything and had the humility to give up some practices that had become second nature to her. Monica became a leader of the devout women in Milan as she had been in Tagaste.

She continued her prayers for Augustine during his years of instruction. At Easter 387, St. Ambrose baptized Augustine and several of his friends. Soon after, his party left for Africa. Although no one else was aware of it, Monica knew her life was near the end. She told Augustine, "Son, nothing in this world now affords me

delight. I do not know what there is now left for me to do or why I am still here, all my hopes in this world being now fulfilled." She became ill shortly after and suffered severely for nine days before her death.

Almost all we know about St. Monica is in the writings of St. Augustine, especially his Confessions.

Reflection

Today, with Google searches, online shopping, text messages, tweets, and instant credit, we have little patience for things that take time. Likewise, we want instant answers to our prayers. Monica is a model of patience. Her long years of prayer, coupled with a strong, well-disciplined character, finally led to the conversion of her hot-tempered husband, her cantankerous mother-in-law and her brilliant but wayward son, Augustine.
