

Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)
Sept 12th, 2021
Is 50:5-9a / Ps 116:1-6, 8-9 / Jas 2:14-18 / Mk 8:27-35

Caesarea is located in the northern part of Galilee, near the headwaters of Jordan. Unlike most of the holy land, which is fairly dry, Caesarea Philippi is in an area where there is lot of water and vegetation. At the time of Jesus there was a shrine dedicated to the Greek god Pan. Pan was that Greek god whose head and torso was human, but the lower part of his body was the body of a goat. Pan was the god of nature, woods and fields, flocks, and shepherds. He loved to romp through the fields playing his flute leading a group of dancing nymphs. He was blamed for striking terror in people who had to travel through fields and forests at night, and this is where we get the word “panic”. This is probably more than you wanted to know about Greek mythology, but in the cliffs around Caesarea Philippi there are carved a number of niches where statues of Greek gods and goddess were enshrined. Surrounded by all these gods and goddesses, Jesus asked his disciples: “Who do people say I am?” Then he asked: “Who do you say I am?” Here is the true God, the Lord of all creation, asking “Am I on a level with all of those other gods and goddesses? Do you think I am something greater or something less?” Peter said, “You are the Christ, i.e., you are the Messiah, the long-awaited savior.”

In our reflection today, let us also see how the Gospel relates to the first chapter of Genesis.

When God put Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, he told them: “You may eat of all the trees in the garden. But of the tree of knowledge of good and evil you are not to eat, for on the day you eat of it you shall most surely die” (2:17).

Well, we know the rest of the story. They listened to the voice of the devil, and they fell. What, basically, did their fall consist of? This is an easy question to answer: they disobeyed God and listened to the devil. And what did the devil tell them? He told them that they need not depend on God for happiness. All they had to do was to follow their own desires and eat from the forbidden tree. Then they would have more than they had now, and that would make them happy.

When Peter objects to Jesus’ prediction that he will suffer at the hands of the chief priests and scribes and be put to death, Jesus tells him, “Get out of my sight, you Satan! You are judging by God’s standards but by man’s.” Peter could not accept the fact that Jesus, the one whom he had just identified as the Messiah, would undergo such ignominious suffering and death. And so, just as Adam put his will before the will of God, so too did Peter, trying to persuade Jesus not to carry out his plan. In short, he was advising Jesus not to suffer and certainly, not to give up his life. There must be a better way.

A little later in the Gospel passage, we see Jesus telling the disciples something very closely related to all this. “If a man wishes to come after me, he must deny his very self, take up his cross, and follow in my steps. Whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel’s will save it.”

So much of what we do comes down to a matter of choice. Furthermore, we are free to choose. And yet, we must consider the consequences of our choices: whether they will enrich or impoverish us. The important thing, as Jesus tells us here, is to live for God rather than for oneself, and to put His desires before our own. This will certainly involve certain sacrifices because His standards are high. But, again, as Jesus tells us, nothing can compare with the consequences of good choices. “Whoever would save his life will lost it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel’s will save it.”





Saint of the Week

The Story of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross


Early in the fourth century, Saint Helena, mother of the Roman Emperor Constantine, went to Jerusalem in search of the holy places of Christ's life. She razed the second-century Temple of Aphrodite, which tradition held was built over the Savior's tomb, and her son built the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher on that spot. During the excavation, workers found three crosses. Legend has it that the one on which Jesus died was identified when its touch healed a dying woman.

The cross immediately became an object of veneration. At a Good Friday celebration in Jerusalem toward the end of the fourth century, according to an eyewitness, the wood was taken out of its silver container and placed on a table together with the inscription Pilate ordered placed above Jesus' head: Then "all the people pass through one by one; all of them bow down, touching the cross and the inscription, first with their foreheads, then with their eyes; and, after kissing the cross, they move on."

To this day, the Eastern Churches, Catholic and Orthodox alike, celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on the September anniversary of the basilica's dedication. The feast entered the Western calendar in the seventh century after Emperor Heraclius recovered the cross from the Persians, who had carried it off in 614, 15 years earlier. According to the story, the emperor intended to carry the cross back into Jerusalem himself, but was unable to move forward until he took off his imperial garb and became a barefoot pilgrim. Reflection

The cross is today the universal image of Christian belief. Countless generations of artists have turned it into a thing of beauty to be carried in procession or worn as jewelry. To the eyes of the first Christians, it had no beauty. It stood outside too many city walls, decorated only with decaying corpses, as a threat to anyone who defied Rome's authority—including Christians who refused sacrifice to Roman gods. Although believers spoke of the cross as the instrument of salvation, it seldom appeared in Christian art unless disguised as an anchor or the Chi-Rho until after Constantine's edict of toleration.
