

THE FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

Astronomers estimate that there are billions of stars in the universe and there are millions of galaxies. It is a wonder that these billions of stars do not collide with one another.

There must be a Divine Architect that is responsible for their being, for the process that resulted in this universe of stars and planets. In our gospel reading today, God used a special and unusual star which twinkled across the heavens, drawing the wise men from the east, all the way to Jerusalem. The perseverance of the magi inspires us on our long journey from this life to the kingdom.

We can easily see God's presence in our good fortune and successes, but we feel abandoned by him in our times of trials and failures. On this feast of epiphany, we are reminded that, even in the trying moments of our existence, God's love is beaming. Like a star, though seemingly absent during storms and cloudy nights, it

remains firm and shining. Like a star, though invisible during the day, it becomes visibly bright in the dark times of our life.

The word **magi** is derived from the original Greek text **magoi**. Most likely they were from Persia or Babylon and were priests of the Zoroastrian religion. Known for their wisdom and their ability to interpret dreams and astrological phenomena. The magi reacted with joy and adoration when the star finally led them to the presence of the child Jesus. These people of knowledge and stature were filled with reverent worship as they prostrated themselves before the king of kings. They were people who sought faithfully the light of truth and, once they found it, they humbly submitted themselves to it.


We are the modern-day **magi** following the light of the gospel that will eventually bring us to the fullness of Jesus. We look with the eyes of faith, sustained with hope, that on our pilgrimage in this life, God's love endures until the end. Let us also pray that we too may become stars to other people, that through our word and example, we can animate them to follow Jesus.

The Wise Men's Response to Baby Jesus Foreshadows Our Response at Christ's Return

Philippians 2:9-11 says, "For this reason God highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee will bow— in heaven and on earth and under the earth—and every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

HIS MARVELOUS PRESENCE IN ME, IN YOU - Joseph Christopher Steger

Recently I was praying with the passage of the three kings coming to the child Jesus and I had a profound experience around this scripture passage. The exact passage was Matthew 2:1-12. Often when I pray with scripture I use imagination prayer, an approach to praying with scripture in which you place yourself in the gospel passage as a participant in the scene. As I began to enter into the prayer, I realized that, rather than seeing things from one of the three kings' perspectives or the perspective of Mary or Joseph, I was being invited into experiencing the scene as the child Jesus.

I am sure that many of you are aware that the magi did not show up on Christmas. Rather the star with they followed appeared on Christmas and they then took a $1\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 years to reach Bethlehem from somewhere in modern day Iraq or Iran possibly even further east. So, when they saw the child Jesus, he was no longer a baby. He was a toddler between $1\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 years old.

When I found myself present in prayer to this scripture scene, I began experiencing the invitation to experience a closeness and nearness to the child Jesus. The nearness was so close that it felt as though I was the one being given the gold, frankincense and myrrh. It was so close that I felt as though I was being worshiped by the maqi.


What I realized, though, was that Jesus and my "prayer self" seemed to occupy the same intrinsic space, that my spiritual essence seemed so entwined with his presence that the worship, which scripture proclaims completely belongs to Jesus alone, with which each one of us is called to give him - he doesn't keep to himself. He actually lets us partake of being worshiped in a mystical way.

The treasures which were being offered to the child, and it was incredible wealth that was being offered, the wealth of kings, was also mine.

It was an experience of knowing in a deeper way how close Jesus and I are. How everything that I have and everything that he has belong to each other. As St. Paul says, the riches of Christ are ours because we are part of his body.

I share this with all of you to invite you to experience the nearness of Jesus to you. That everything you have is his and that everything he has is yours. There is such unity to the point of there being no separation between you and him. While there is a distinction, in the way that there is a distinction between the different parts of the body, there is no separation.

What wonderful, marvelous joy flowing into our hearts to finally know that we belong so completely to Jesus and, He, truly belongs to us.



RECOGNIZE GOD IN ORDINARY MOMENTS Step Into the Light

How strange it is to think that if not for Herod's directions, the magi would not have known where to find Jesus. They were not Jews, they knew nothing of the old prophecies. It was Herod who convened the scholars. It was Herod who pointed the way — for ulterior motives, certainly, but nonetheless, this is the part he played. It was Herod who made the Epiphany possible.

"Nations shall walk by your light, and kings by your shining radiance," writes the prophet (Isaiah 60:3). A king may keep to the shadows, suspicious of the light — he may foolishly imagine he can snatch it from the sky to keep as his own possession, and, upon finding the light cannot be governed, grow to loathe it, and even seek to extinguish it once and for all.

But all his grand designs will come to nothing because there is no king so powerful that he can see in the dark. And even a man like Herod — a man so jealous that he sought to kill God — cannot prevent the breaking of day.

The Epiphany marks the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles. It is a celebration of truth reaching places it was not expected to reach, of brightness illuminating corners of the world long ago consigned to shadow. It is a reminder that the battle has already been won, the night is over. All that remains is for us to decide: will we step into the light?

"See, darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds cover the peoples; but upon you the LORD shines, and over you appears his glory." — Isaiah 60:2



Saint Gregory Nazianzen

After his baptism at 30, Gregory gladly accepted his friend Saint Basil's invitation to join him in a newly founded monastery. The solitude was broken when Gregory's father, a bishop, needed help in his diocese and estate. It seems that Gregory was ordained a priest practically by force, and only reluctantly accepted the responsibility. He skillfully avoided a schism that threatened when his own father made compromises with Arianism. At 41, Gregory was chosen suffragan bishop of Caesarea and at once came into conflict with Valens, the emperor, who supported the Arians. An unfortunate by-product of the battle was the cooling of the friendship of two saints. Basil, his archbishop, sent him to a miserable and unhealthy town on the border of unjustly created divisions in his diocese. Basil reproached Gregory for not going to his See.


When protection for Arianism ended with the death of Valens, Gregory was called to rebuild the faith in the great see of Constantinople, which had been under Arian teachers for three decades. Retiring and sensitive, he dreaded being drawn into the whirlpool of corruption and violence. He first stayed at a friend's home, which became the only orthodox church in the city. In such surroundings, he began giving the great sermons on the Trinity for which he is famous. In time, Gregory did rebuild the faith in the city, but at the cost of great suffering, slander, insults, and even personal violence. An interloper even tried to take over his bishopric.


His last days were spent in solitude and austerity. He wrote religious poetry, some of it autobiographical, of great depth and beauty. He was acclaimed simply as "the Theologian." St. Gregory Nazianzen shares the celebration of his liturgical feast with St.

Basil the Great on January 2.

Reflection

It may be small comfort, but post-Vatican II turmoil in the Church is a mild storm compared to the devastation caused by the Arian heresy, a trauma the Church has never forgotten. Christ did not promise the kind of peace we would love to have—no problems, no opposition, no pain. In one way or another, holiness is always the way of the cross.of





Wise Men See God in the Simple Things

If you're on social media, you have probably seen a meme going around that features this quote: "God has a plan for your life. The enemy has a plan for your life. Be ready for both. Just be wise enough to know which one to battle and which one to embrace."

There were certainly two competing plans for the Magi: God's and Herod's. And, wise as they supposedly were, it wasn't entirely easy for the Magi to discern which was which.

After all, Herod posed as a friend. He offered the Magi hospitality and kindness. Though the Gospel doesn't say so, he probably flattered them and appealed to every moral weakness he could observe in them. In his palace, they must have felt great physical comfort — rest and tables of plenty on what was an otherwise long and treacherous journey.

But if the Magi were honest with themselves, I'll bet they would have admitted that, regardless of Herod's charm, they felt a gnawing sense of doubt while in his presence. When they looked upon the Christ Child, born in a stable without any of the comforts of the world or protections of wealth, they probably felt the opposite. They probably felt safe.

The Magi were lucky enough to have the right plan spelled out for them in a dream, but for the rest of us, it's enough to remember this: God's plan is often the one that leads us to places of great simplicity, great humility and great love. Let's have the wisdom to view power with suspicion, and innocence with admiration.

Everyday Stewardship

My mother-in-law was the best gift-giver I ever knew. One could say my parents spoiled me growing up, but there was something about her gifts to me that made me feel overwhelmed. I guess it was that after several years I still was surprised that she would think enough of me to get me something no one else would. She was able to make me feel special every time. Of course, I believe she honored me in this way because I accepted her greatest gift to me, her daughter.

Sadly, my mother-in-law did not live long in this world. She passed away over a decade ago due to an aggressive cancer. Some of her material gifts to me remain, while others are long gone. But the memories and the effect of those gifts remain because it was never all about the gifts themselves. It was about relationship. It was about her and me. It was about love.

What we offer Jesus is never about the gift itself. It is about the motivation behind the action and the effect that action has on the body of Christ. Many of the gifts we give today to God and his people will fade away like the mist of the early morning, but the effects of those actions will last forever. It is about relationship. It is about God and us. It is about love.

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Gospel Meditation

A stranger in a foreign land, I was exhausted and homesick as my summer Spanish immersion ended in Guatemala. The rusty minivan arriving outside my small residence filled me with joyful hope. I was flying home to the U.S. and would be, at long last, completely happy. Or so I thought. After about half an hour of being home, I thought to myself, "This place is boring. I want to go somewhere." So, I hopped in my car and left to see my friends. As I drove, I wistfully wondered, "Where am I truly at home?"

The feast of Epiphany has a lot to do with our notion of home. Where is our origin? Where are we going? When is our wandering done? Saint Matthew tells us of the Magi, "They were overjoyed at seeing the star." This star will bring them home, to a place where their questing will end, and they will be satisfied. Their real home is neither in the East nor in the earthly Jerusalem. Somehow, their home is wherever this boy and his parents are.

If you're a teenager or older, you probably know by now that every physical home we have is temporary. So, we look up at the countless stars in our proverbial skies: things which bedazzle and beckon us to follow toward peace. The Gospel invites us to behold that — at long last — God has sent us a star to follow home, one that whispers, "Follow me! I will take you home!" Perhaps that star is your spouse. A friend. An opportunity. A cause. An intuition about a new direction. A prayer group. What is it for you? How will you know? It will lead you to Mary and Joseph and their son, and you will be home.


