



#### TRANSFORMING ORDINARY MOMENTS

In the Bible are stories of brothers in conflict with each other. Think of Cain who killed his brother Abel. Remember Jacob who cheated his brother Esau out of his blessing. And not to forget the 11 guys who sold their brother Joseph into slavery. Sibling rivalry is an undeniable thing, then and now.

Jesus had no qualms in including brothers in his band of disciples.

There were many fishermen working on the lake of Galilee. The Jewish historian Josephus mentions that during his time as governor of Galilee, there were 330 fishing boats on that lake. But Jesus chose brothers from among these simple, uneducated fishermen—the brothers Simon and Andrew, John and James.

In the general run of things, human beings, when faced with the completion of important tasks, tend to focus on external goals, will build teams consisting of people with the right social connections, those with the wealth of resources, and those with significant mastery and proven expertise.

Jesus was different. He looked at what the person would become in the course of following Him.

When Jesus called these brothers, He called them to Him from the ordinariness of daily tasks.

My point is, we don't have to wait until we are in church to be close to God and hear His call. God is present everywhere, even dullness of daily routine.

Spiritual writers call this transformation of daily work and routine as "sanctification of work".

Follow me, was Jesus' simple invitation. He did not lecture them, or even tell them where He would lead them. And they did not ask what we would ask, "Why? Where to? What for?"

They just left everything behind and became Jesus' companions for the rest of their life.

Are we beset by all sorts of questions in our personal journeys?

Am I bored with my work and life? Am I aware of God's presence in my daily routine? What can I do to transform and sanctity my daily work?

If you have never bothered to listen deeply before, why not try this once? Seek His voice in the humdrum moments of your days.

"Come, follow me!"

## THE GREAT ADVENTURE

"This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine" is a phrase that I'm sure most of us are familiar with. It is from a song which most of us would have learned when we were children in Sunday School or with the nuns in Catholic School. The song is based on the words of Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew 5:14-16.

You are the light of the world. A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and then put it under a bushel basket; it is set on a lampstand, where it gives light to all in the house. Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father.

When most of us hear these words what thoughts does it conjure up? For many of us we probably think of doing and acting in a particular way which measures up to some sort of moral or ethical standard of what or how we think a Christian is supposed to act. The text itself seems to point towards this when it speaks about good deeds. Is this all that this Gospel passage is telling us or is there more to it though?


While the moral and ethical reading of the passage is an important aspect it does not tell the whole story. Doing good deeds is not the purpose of our life as Christians. If it were then we could be secular atheists or agnostics who live morally upstanding lives, which many of them do a much better job at than many Christians. But that is not the point. The point is that we are supposed to have a light, something within us, that shines out so brightly that it is like a city on a mountain top or a lamp on a lampstand in the dark. No one can ignore it. And not only can they not ignore it, but they are drawn to it.

In the ancient world anything outside of cities or places of human settlement could be quite terrifying. There were wild animals and robbers outside of the walls of human habitation. If you have ever been in true darkness even the smallest light makes a world of difference. The power that these two examples have to draw people speaks to the profound reality which Jesus is speaking of when he speaks about the light. But what exactly is that light?

The text says that we are the light. It says, "You are the light of the world". So clearly it is us. What is it about us though that shines and makes us the light of the world? It is friend-ship with Jesus Christ, and through him friendship with the Father and the Holy Spirit. It is the abiding presence of the Holy Trinity, the Godhead, within us who have been baptized into Christ's death and resurrection. There is a caveat though. While all of us have the light of Christ alive within us by nature of our baptism our willingness and or ability to engage in that relationship determines how bright of a light we are. The greatest saints of the Church were not people who did fantastic things. Rather, they were people who gave themselves completely to Christ. He became everything for them.

We are also invited into this great adventure of becoming the close companions of Jesus. As we draw closer to him and let our hearts gradually be given over to him more, the light within us will grow brighter until we are completely set ablaze.



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# **Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture**

We start telling lies around the age of three, the experts tell us. It's understandable. Lying is a god-like power. Whatever I want, I need only say it, and the world rearranges itself accordingly. It's amazing at first. But soon reality snaps back and I'm faced with a dilemma. If I remain committed to my lie I start to fracture into pieces. My words and reality drift apart, and I find myself lost in a lonely world of further falsehoods and fear of being found out.

How marvelous, then, that Jesus begins his ministry by proclaiming: "Repent!" We tend to think it means "stop doing bad things" but it doesn't. It literally means "go beyond the mind you have." Think in a new way. It's painful to admit, but some portion of my mind is addicted to lie-telling, usually to protect my ego or make life easier. To repent means to admit this tendency, to say, "I'm done lying," and to move beyond my split mind into a complete commitment to the truth. Perhaps that's why at Mass we together proclaim, "I have sinned in my thoughts, and in my words…" Repentance and truth-telling work together.

Those who know the twelve-step process of addiction recovery know this process well. The fourth step requires radical truth-telling: listing our moral defects. This isn't being scrupulous. Rather it is freedom from falsehood, and entrance into the real world. This week, I invite you to join me in this practice. Get your phone or piece of paper. Answer the question: what are your true moral defects? Write them down. Remember, the Lord knows them already and loves you. We have a sacrament where this truth-telling is celebrated: Confession. Perhaps it is finally time to go beyond our childish lies.

#### A Good Time for Fulfillment

There are some things that always come at the worst time. I've never gotten a telemarketing call and thought, "This is a really convenient moment for me to listen to a sales pitch." I've never seen the compulsory software update notice flash on my computer screen when I didn't have a deadline I was struggling to meet. My kids never come down with the flu unless it's the weekend and the line at Urgent Care is stretching out the door.

And I never, ever feel the calm, persistent shouldertap of the Holy Spirit without thinking, "Now? Now is not a good time. Can you try again when I'm..."

But then I stop and think: when I am what? When I am stronger? When I am happier? When I am smarter? When I am a different person?

When God calls us, He calls the person He sees in front of Him. "Come on," He says, and He doesn't mean "When you're finished" or "When it's convenient" or "Think about it." He means now. This moment.

This is what Paul is saying when he writes that "the world in its present form is passing away." He is saying that your plans mean nothing, the kingdom of God is at hand. Abandon your nets, let your catch escape into the sea. You're not who you thought you were, and you don't need what you thought you needed.

Your sins do not define you. Your fears are not fate. Your inclinations do not govern you. Your life can be changed. We live in the time of fulfillment, and fulfillment is coming for you — ready or not.

# Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

#### Question:

Can a person (the mother, father, or provider) ever be forgiven for an abortion?

#### **Answer:**

For people of faith, any conversation of human sinfulness should always lead us to reflect on God's loving mercy. Because God's mercy is greater than any sin, the Church is clear that even those involved in the sin of abortion can be reconciled with God and the Church. To help make this grace more available through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, Pope Francis extended the permission to absolve someone of the sin of abortion to all priests in 2016.

Even with the grace and blessings of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, the tragedy of abortion and the aftermath of abortion takes a toll on everyone involved. Ministries of outreach and support, such as Project Rachel, offer pastoral counseling, support groups, retreats, and other forms of care. As Christians, we are also called to help promote this healing and reconciliation in all its forms.


